Have Kept Hand in Hand.
Washington, October 1.—The bureau of labor will shortly issue the results of an exhaustive study of the increased cost of living during the last few years, in relation to the increase of wages. The results show that there is a striking similarity between the advance in wages and in the increased cost of living and that neither has gone forward as much as popularly supposed. The current report that commodities have advanced 27 per cent is shown to be wide of the mark. It will be nearer 15 or 17 per cent.
