gether in a Chicago hotel on the night of October 20, 1901. Mrs. Nichols was down-hearted and she and Burnett agreed to commit suicide. They purchased poison, and after retiring the woman swallowed a sufficient quantity to cause death.

An Aged Couple Killed Near Edgar. Last Friday, Mr. and Mrs. G. W. Turner were both killed about two miles east of Edgar by Burlington train No. 97 at a crossing.

The remains were taken to Cambridge for burial, their only son being buried at that place. Two daughters survive them, one 19 and the other 13 years of age. The old gentleman is estimated to
