Ranks Second in America.
 The following from the Atwood, Kansas, Patriot has some local significance for the reason that very many of the horses referred to come from Southwestern Nebraska. And again, Mr. Tillitt was for a while in the livery and sales business in McCook:
 "George Tillitt returned the first of the week from the northeast corner of the county and over in Nebraska where he has been buying horses. He shipped a car load from Herndon last Sunday night. It may be a surprise to some people to know that Tillitt & Blackburn ranked second last year in the United States in the number of horses shipped and amount paid for same among the individual buyers. The only firm that excelled them was one that employs from six to fifteen men as buyers all the time. As Mr. Tillitt buys most of the stock shipped by Blackburn he easily ranks as first of the horse buyers of the nation. Last year Tillitt & Blackburn paid the farmers of Northwest Kansas over \$100,000 and to March 10th, of this year the total amount paid out was \$17,000. It will be seen by the figures that the prosperity of the western farmer does not always depend on the number of bushels of wheat he has in the granary."

High Price For Hay.
 Wednesday, in County Judge Moore's court, it cost Frank Peacock \$17.05 for failing to distinguish between his own hay and hay owned by G. W. Predmore. The fine was \$10.00, there was \$3 for restitution of prosperity, and \$4.05 in costs.
