MIRACLE MILO'S DARING LEAP
In Leaping the Volcanic Gap Bicyclist All But Over-Shot the Incline

DARE-DEVIL RIDER HURLED FROM HIS WHEEL
His Injuries Not Serious, and He, With Other Sensational Performers, Will Fill Their Engagement in our City

A thrilling climax was put on the carnival Thursday night by the introduction to the patrons of the big show of Miracle Milo, leaping the volcanic gap in the Romanic Hippodrome. This big feature was announced for the entire week, but a new gap had to be secured and it only arrived yesterday.

The performance was a very trying one to the dare-devil bicycle rider, as the new gap was altogether different from the old one and he was entirely unfamiliar with it. While he passed through the ordeal without serious injury, Milo was thrown violently to the ground after his bicycle leap across the yawning chasm and received painful bruises.

As it was the first leap on the new gap it was more or less an experiment. It turned out that the gap was not broad enough, for Milo in his hurricane race down the incline went over the gap with such momentum that he all but leaped clear beyond the twelve-foot platform about thirty feet from where the leap was made. It was muddy at the end of the platform and the bicycle and its rider went down. Attendance rushed to the daring performer. He was stunned by the impact with the ground, but soon recovered. The act made a strong impression on the spectators. The leaping the gap performance fills out a trio of most sensational acts carried by the C. W. Parker Amusement com-

pany, the other two being the high dive of Miss Florence Spray and looping the loop by the girl from Abeline and Reckless Russell.

All the Pike attractions again had a prosperous night. From the crazy house at one end of the Pike around to the Hippodrome, taking in the Electric Theatre, Pretty Peggy from Paris, Katzenjammer Kastle, Tyrolean Alps, the other attractions, all profited by the night of fun.

A feature tonight will be a change of program in the Electric Theatre. The pictures offered tonight will be "Tracked by Bloodhounds," a reproduction of thrilling events in Cripple Creek, beginning with the murder of a miner's wife and ending with a lynching; the Monroe-Jeffries fight and the great train robbery.

The popularity of the Parker shows grows space, the attendance being larger with each succeeding night. It is expected that the enclosure will hardly be large enough to contain the crowd to night and Saturday. The growing popularity of the shows has given rise to the rumor that they will stay over and exhibit Sunday, but it is improbable that this will be done; in fact, Mr. Edwards, owner of the C. W.
