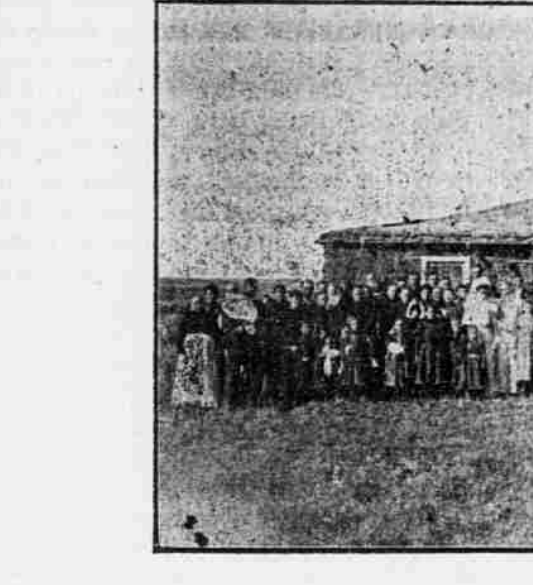

Indiana's Gold and Silver.

Excitement of the wildest character prevails in Warwick county, Indiana, over the discovery of gold and silver near Lynnville. The land where the ore has been found is of the poorest, but owners are paying up back taxes in the hope of realizing handsomely. Hotels and restaurants are crowded with strangers and many more are arriving daily.

Mistakes Made at the Mint.

John Erhard of Philadelphia has a coin dated 1891, which has a head on either side, showing that mistakes are made even at the mint. Every finished coin passes through the hands of a great many experts, and there is little chance of an imperfect piece escaping this scrutiny. There are said to be many of them in circulation, however. No particular value is attached to the coins outside of their rarity as curiosities.

In this same way that milk is susceptible to odors, so it attracts disease germs; diphtheria, typhoid fever, etc., are often contracted in this manner. This is not always due to carelessness, for these bacilli are in the very air we breathe. The only true safeguard when contagious disease is about to sterilize the milk.

Depredations of Foxes on Cattle.

Citizens of Oklahoma and adjoining counties of Texas are in a state of terror because of the depredations of coyotes, which are killing scores of cattle. Worse than that, the sinking brutes are spreading hydrophobia among the stock. A man living in Tilden was bitten by an infected colt and died in a few days. Ways and means of getting rid of the pests are being considered.
