Sewer Bid Accepted.

City council met in adjourned session, last Friday evening, with full board present.

Ten sewer bids were found on file with the city clerk.

Following resolution was adopted: Whereas, the bid of F. S. Dobson is the lowest and best bid, to wit, as per proposal: 8-inch pipe 53c.; 12-inch pipe 63c.; 15-inch pipe 83c.; 15-inch cast iron pipe \$1.50; brick manholes \$4.07; concrete manholes \$4.75 per foot.

Therefore be it resolved, that the city council accept his bid and award him the contract to construct the sewer; and that the mayor and clerk be authorized to sign a contract on behalf of the city, and that the bond of the said contractor be and the same is fixed at \$5,000 to be approved by the mayor.

Druggist permit was granted L. W. McConnell.

Billiard hall licenses were granted Burnett & Benjamin and Kendlen & Stevens.

A plumber's license was granted John Hunt.

The purchase was authorized of 500 feet of "Royal Brand" of fire hose at 37½ cents per foot.

Council adjourned to meet on Monday evening, April 30th, 1906, at 8 o'clock.

No sessions of the council was held on Monday evening, quorum lacking.
