"A Modern Slavery," by Henry W. Nevins. Dr. Nevins traveled into Africa to discover the true and startling facts of the tyrannical slave trade secretly carried on by the Portuguese in spite of the Berlin Treaty of 1895. He has revealed to the world a valuable and appalling chapter in current history which cries to the whole world for redress.

"Evolution the Master-Key," by C. W. Saleeby. This volume deals with the theory of evolution in relation to the scientific discoveries of the present age. The author holds that the truth of the law of evolution is more easily demonstrated today than ever before. The newest sciences, each dealing with evolution in a different sphere combined to assert its validity. Furthermore the results of modern investigation point more and more to evolution as the master-key to the solution of the problems of all phenomena. "Joseph Jefferson" by Francis Wilson. Francis Wilson, the well-known actor, knew Joseph Jefferson for many years, and was associated with him in the all-star cast of "The Rivals." Throughout his acquaintance, Mr. Wilson kept abundant notes of actual conversations with Mr. Jefferson, and he has produced in this volume of recollections what is the nearest view of Joseph Jefferson yet given, except in the Actors' Autobiography. There are chapters describing him as a painter, his recreations as a fisherman with Mr. Cleveland and other friends, his development of the play "Rip Van Winkle," in short, reflections of the long and happy life of the most beloved American actor.
