The lungs, lymphatic glands, pericardium, or few weeks. heart sack, the heart itself and pleura were studded with the little tubercles in all stages of development. The carcass and all the viscera were condemned as unfit for food and were cheerfully burned by the proprietors. Dr. Jones has specimens of the lungs, lymphatic glands, pleura and liver in his possession which he will keep in preservatives.
