Dog Tax.
Owners of dogs in the city of McCook will take notice that the dog tax must be paid on or before June 20, 1907. All dogs on which the tax has not been paid in accordance with the ordinance will be destroyed. The tax should be paid to the City Treasurer—\$2.00 for the male and \$3.00 for each female.

Owners are cautioned to see that licensed dogs are provided with a collar and tag in accordance with the ordinance, to prevent their being taken and destroyed. Dated June 12, 1907.
