Republican Congressional Convention.

The Republican delegate convention of the Fifth Nebraska district was held in Hastings, Monday. It was largely attended, and an enthusiastic Norris gathering.

I. D. Evans of Kenesaw, Adams county, was chairman, and J. R. McCarl, of McCook, Red Willow county, secretary. National delegates from the Fifth district are A. W. Sterne of Hall county, J. C. Gammill of Frontier county. Sterne's alternate is Jennison of Clay and Gammill's alternate is C. W. Kaley of Webster.

The rousing resolutions passed follow:

RESOLUTIONS.
We, the Republicans of the Fifth Congressional District of Nebraska, in convention assembled, do hereby reaffirm our allegiance to the principles of the Republican party as enunciated by its long regime of unprecedented national prosperity, unequalled in the annals of national existence, and as proclaimed by our last national and state platforms, and championed from the time of Lincoln to the present.

Will Go Some.

The horse races at the state fair, the first week in September, as announced by the committee, are as follows: Stakes to close May 1st; 2:35 and 2:21 trotting for purses of \$1,000 each, 3-year-old; 3-year-old 2:45 for Nebraska bred colts, trotting, each for purses of \$500, and a 2-year-11 trot for \$250.

2:30, 2:22 and 2:14 pacing, each for a purse of \$1,000; 3-year-old; 3-year-old 2:40 for Nebraska bred colts, each for a purse of \$500, and 2-year-old pace for \$250.

The classes closing August 10th will be as follows: 2:30, 2:25 and 2:17 trotting, each for \$500; 2:35, 2:25 and 2:18 and free-for-all pacing, each for a purse of \$500.

Running: 2-year-old Nebraska bred colts, 4 1/2 furlongs for \$200, and a Derby 1 1/6 miles for \$300, besides seven other running races ranging from one-half to one mile. We would suggest that our horsemen write to W. R. Mellor, secretary, Lincoln for further particulars.
