

The Austrian said he had the sense to leave "under cover." He had \$8,50 with him, his savings of months, after he had paid \$3 for his job. Nogga started home on foot, passing through Trinidad, Lajunta and Caddoa, Colo., a mountainous country. He slept out of doors at Lamar, Colo., January 17. He walked the tracks by day and built a fire at night, often suffering from the cold and hunger. He was saving a small sum of money to take him back to Kansas City, when he felt that he could walk no further. That time came when he reached Emporia. 
