THE ELECTRIC LIGHT PLANT DAMAGED. Fire Causes a Loss of Perhaps a Thousand Dollars.

Between three and four o'clock, Monday morning, fire damaged the McCook Electric Light Co.'s plant to the extent of about a thousand dollars. The ENCOURAGES CHAUTAUQUA company has been annoyed for some days by spontaneous combustion in the coal sheds, and the fire is chargeable to that source, several explosions of coal gas spreading the flames and rendering the work of fire-fighting difficult. The first gas explosion is said to have raised the roof of the coal shed several feet.

The flames were confined to the coal shed and boiler room, the roofs being burned entirelly off of both of them-The gas producer is in this section of the plant, but escaped damage. The piping is all injured, Both boilers are slightly damaged and the stacks of both boilers considerably so by sinking down into the masonry. Loss of coal is considerable.

In a very short time, however, Manager Scott had a force of men at work clearing away the debris and commencing the labor of rebuilding and repairing, so they were able to give current for the business part of the city, Monday night, although the residence part could not be supplied.

The fire-fighting was done largely by the members of the irregular "nighthawks" brigade, but effectively, being materially assisted by good water pressure given by the company.
