

Representative Payne of New York and Representative Dalzell have been re-elected and the house of representatives probably will continue under its old regime. Mr. Payne will have charge of the new tariff bill in the extra session, which Mr. Taft will call immediately after March 4 next. Judge Taft's plurality in the state of New York, according to corrected returns, is 203,495, more than 18,000 in excess of President Roosevelt's plurality of four years ago. Governor in Ohio made figures extraordinarily late, owing to the immense size of the ballot. Mr. Taft carried his own state, however, by 50,000 plurality, a reduction of more than 200,000 from the Roosevelt vote of four years ago. The Democratic state ticket in Ohio, headed by Judson Harmon for governor, appears to be safely elected. The state legislature, which is to choose a successor to Senator Foraker, appears

TAFT CARRIES HIS HOME STATE.

Reports on Covernorship Unfavorable to Harris.

Cincinnati, Nov. 5 .- A lead of about 50,000 for Judge Taft, the Republican candidate for president, was the election-day expression of the voters of Ohio, who, however, at the same time chose the head of the Democratic state ticket, Judson Harmon, by a plurality of 20,000. 
