## SUCCESSFUL FARMERS' INSTITUTE

And a Most Interesting Boys' Corn-Growing and Girls'  
Cooking and Sewing Contest.

OVER 600 PUPILS AND OTHERS IN ATTENDANCE

From All Over Red Willow County, and the Interest and Exhibits  
Were Most Gratifying.—Details of the Awards  
Made in Each Class.

The Farmers' Institute and Boys' Corn-Growing and Girls' Cooking and Sewing contests held in McCook, last Saturday, drew to the city a surprisingly large attendance of boys and girls, together with parents and other interested parties from all over the county. Over 400 children made exhibits, and every child received for the effort, if not a premium or prize, at least the sum of 25 cents in cash.

The exhibits were displayed in the court room of the court house, but it soon became evident that the room would not accommodate the crowd present, so an adjournment was taken to the Methodist church, just opposite the court house. This building, using main audience room and league room, was not adequate to the crowd, which exceeded 600. Here the formal program of the occasion was rendered, and the prizes announced.

## TAFT WINS BY HUGE MARGIN.

Republicans Carry  
New York, Ohio  
and Indiana.

CANNON AND HUGHES IN

Greater New York is Repub-  
lican for President for First  
Time in Twelve Years.

New York, Nov. 5.—Returns received this morning indicate that William H. Taft of Ohio, as president-elect, will have a vote of 309 in the electoral college. This is within sixteen votes of the forecast made by National Chairman Frank H. Hitchcock and sixty-seven more than a majority of the total electoral vote of 483. If Missouri votes for Taft, his total may reach 327. News of the late returns indicate that Maryland, after vacillating during the day and apparently being safe for the Democracy, has swung into the Taft column. The unofficial figures give Mr. Taft the state by 136 votes.

Indiana and West Virginia, as well as Montana, turned out to be safely Republican. Colorado went for Bryan. If Missouri, which late developments place in the doubtful column, goes Democratic, Mr. Bryan will have a total of 174 votes, two less than he received in 1896. In 1904 Mr. Parker received only 140. In 1900 Mr. Bryan received 155 votes and in 1896 the Nebraskan received 175 votes.

Mr. Taft's 309 electoral votes compare with 336 received by Roosevelt in 1904, 292 received by McKinley in 1900 and 271 received by McKinley in 1896. National Chairman Norman E. Mack of the Democratic party issued a statement, in which he declared he did not believe Mr. Bryan would again be a candidate for the presidency. He said he believed that the Nebraskan might be a candidate for the United States senate in 1911, provided the legislature of his state is Democratic in that year, when the first vacancy will occur.

Cannon Re-elected to Congress.  
Speaker Cannon has been re-elected. Representative Payne of New York and Representative Dalcze have been re-elected and the house of representatives probably will continue under its old regime. Mr. Payne will have charge of the new tariff bill in the extra session, which Mr. Taft will call immediately after March 4 next.

Judge Taft's plurality in the state of New York, according to corrected returns, is 203,495, more than 18,000 in excess of President Roosevelt's plurality of four years ago. Governor Charles E. Hughes was re-elected in New York by 71,105. The heavy vote in Ohio made figures extraordinarily late, owing to the immense size of the ballot. Mr. Taft carried his own state, however, by 50,000 plurality, a reduction of more than 200,000 from the Roosevelt vote of four years ago. The Democratic state ticket in Ohio, headed by Judson Harmon for governor, appears to be safely elected. The state legislature, which is to choose a successor to Senator Foraker, appears in doubt as between the Republicans and Democrats.

Mr. Taft's phenomenally large vote in New York state continues to attract attention. It is taken by the Republican managers of the state and country as indicating that the Empire state, with its thirty-nine electoral votes, can no longer be regarded as a debatable ground in a presidential contest, but is safely Republican. The fact that Mr. Taft carried Greater New York by 15,000 votes has amazed many of the local leaders. He gained this advantage largely in Brooklyn, for Manhattan and the Bronx, dominated by Tammany Hall, showed a substantial plurality for Bryan.

In Indiana Mr. Taft was successful in carrying the state by about 8,000, but the entire Democratic state ticket, headed by Marshall for governor, was elected. The congressional delegation from the state shows a gain of seven Democrats.

The returns from West Virginia, owing to the mountainous character of the country, are slow in coming in. A sufficient number of counties and districts have been heard from, however, to show that Mr. Taft has a safe plurality.

Colorado has shifted from the doubtful column to the Bryan list. The legislature, which is to choose a successor to Senator Teller, also is apparently Democratic.

Some Republican Slumps.  
Some of the figures relating to the Republican slump in some states, regarded as certainly Republican are little short of amazing. Pennsylvania's immense plurality of over 500,000 four years ago has been cut in two. Illinois, which gave Roosevelt 305,000 in 1904, has gone for Taft by about 170,000. The highest claim of the Re-

publicans for Indiana is 15,000, against a plurality of 93,000 in 1904.

There has been a shrinkage in the Democratic vote in several of the southern states, notably in Virginia and North Carolina.

Mr. Taft has carried Wisconsin by a plurality estimated at 75,000, a falling off from the Roosevelt plurality of 156,000 in 1904.

Kentucky has gone safely for Mr. Bryan by about 15,000.

Bryan has carried Nebraska by about 10,000.

The indications are the Democratic governors have been elected in several middle western states that have given their presidential votes to Taft.

Mr. Taft has exceeded Mr. Roosevelt's plurality in New Jersey and in Massachusetts, as well as in New York.

The Republican plurality fell off heavily in the middle west, in a manner thoroughly surprising to the Republican leaders.

## TAFT CARRIES HIS HOME STATE.

Reports on Governorship Unfavorable to Harris.

Cincinnati, Nov. 5.—A lead of about 50,000 for Judge Taft, the Republican candidate for president, was the election-day expression of the voters of Ohio, who, however, at the same time chose the head of the Democratic state ticket, Judson Harmon, by a plurality of 20,000. More than half the precincts of the state are included in the figures that show these results, and any difference will be simply as to the size of the plurality, there being no question as to the certainty of the result. The slow count delayed knowledge of the decision as to the legislature and both parties claim to have the majority that will settle the United States senatorship. The same slow count delayed decision as to the balance of the state ticket.

G. O. P. Carries Wisconsin.

Milwaukee, Nov. 4.—The Republican national and state tickets were victorious in Wisconsin by a plurality of 75,000. The congressional delegation will remain about the same as two years ago, nine Republicans and two Democrats. The legislature, which will elect a United States senator to succeed Isaac Stephenson, will be overwhelmingly Republican, the returns indicating the election of 73 Republicans, 21 Democrats and 6 Social Democrats in the assembly, and 27 Republicans, 4 Democrats and 2 Social Democrats in the senate.

Taft Carries Indiana.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 4.—The Democrats of Indiana elected their candidate for governor, Thomas R. Marshall, and probably the entire state Democratic ticket. Eight Democratic congressmen have been elected, a gain of four. The Democrats are also claiming the legislature, which will have the election of a United States senator. Taft received a plurality of about 8,000.

Colorado.

Denver, Nov. 5.—Latest returns show that Bryan and the entire Democratic state ticket, headed by John F. Shafroth for governor, carried Colorado with pluralities in the neighborhood of 5,000. The Democrats probably will control the legislature by a narrow margin, insuring the election of Charles J. Hughes, Jr., as United States senator to succeed Teller.

Taft and Johnson in Minnesota.

Minneapolis, Nov. 4.—Governor John A. Johnson's effort in behalf of the Democratic national ticket have not succeeded in giving the electoral vote of the state to Mr. Bryan, but have availed in re-electing him by a small majority. Taft has carried the state by upward of 75,000. Governor Johnson's majority of 76,633 two years ago was reduced to 25,000.
