**Note the New Game Law.**

The Tribune recently published the new game law provisions, but judging from indications there are quite a number in this vicinity who are still ignorant of the law. For them we repeat the law:

The governor signed the new game law Monday of last week and the bill went into effect that day. The duck and geese season closed that day under this bill and April 10th under the old law. Other changes are: chicken and grouse, October and November; ducks and geese, September 15 to April 5; jacksnipe and yellow legs, September 15 to May 1; plover, July 15 to August 31; quail, October and November. There is no open season for quail, doves, swan or white crane.

**Law That Bumped Omaha.**

S. F. 283, by Wiltse of Cedar—To amend section 14, chapter 50, compiled statutes of the state of Nebraska for the year 1907, to read as follows:

Section 14. Every person who shall sell or give away any malt, spirituous or vinous liquors or any intoxicating drinks, on the day of any general, special or primary election, or at any time during the first days of the week, commonly called Sunday, or at any time upon any week day, after the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. and before the hour of 7 o'clock a. m., of the following day, shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of \$100 and his license shall be forfeited and cancelled by the board granting the same forthwith, whether such person convicted shall appeal therefrom or not.

Section 2. That section 14, chapter 50, compiled statutes of the state of Nebraska for the year 1907, as heretofore existing, is hereby repealed.
