Law That Bumped Omaha.

S. F. 283, by Wiltse of Cedar-To amend section 14, chapter 50, compiled statutes of the state of Nebraska for the year 1907, to read as follows:

Section 14. Every person who shall sell or give away any malt, spirituous or vinous liquors or any intoxicating drinks, on the day of any general, special or primary election, or at any time during the first days of the week, commonly called Sunday, or at any time upon any week day, after the hour of So'clock p. m. and before the hour of 7 o'clock a. m., of the following day, shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of \$100 and his license shall be forfeited and cancelled by the board granting the same forthwith, whether such person convicted shall appeal therefrom or not.
