The Nebraska State Railway commission has ordered the Burlington to restore its freight trains to the schedule from which they had been dropped some time ago. The Burlington had been dropping some of its regular freight trains and stock trains and is running them as specials. When this was done the Burlington issued an order that passengers would not be carried on special freights and stock trains. This worked such an inconvenience to traveling men that they protested to the commission and their houses protested for them. The commission also has ordered the Burlington to appear and show cause why action at law should not be begun against that road for discontinuing train service without authority. One traveling man, representing one of the South Omaha packing houses, showed the commission where his livery bill had been increased over \$600 a year by the action of the Burlington in withdrawing some of its regular trains from the schedule and running them as specials.—Omaha Bee. Conductor T. A. Nash is off duty with an injured hand. Engine 1749 is in the backshop for broken frame repairs. The Denver engines Nos. 723 and 1404 are here for new flues. A Sterling engine No. 1388 has just arrived for a new cylinder. Nick Snyder has been temporarily transferred from the repair to the air department. This division now has 110 engines, the biggest number on any division west of the river. Brakeman W. E. Wade was recently severely injured at Oxford by being struck on the head by the water crane as the train was passing the water tank.

County Commissioners' Proceedings.

McCook, Nebraska, November 20, 1909. The board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment, present S. Premer, C. B. Gray and F. S. Lofton, county commissioners, and Chas. Skalla, county clerk. The minutes of the meeting held November 12 were read and on motion approved. The petition of S. V. Free, J. E. Perdue and others, asking for the establishment of public roads that are read and considered, the Board finds that a line of land along the line of the proposed road have given their consent thereto in writing; on motion the petition was granted, established as a public road as follows: (Said Road to be known as Road No. 62) Commencing at a point in the north line of Road No. 62 which is 32 rods west of the west line of the S. E. 1/4 of the N. E. 1/4 (Lot No. 7) of section 15 in township 3 north, of range 27 in Red Willow County, thence north 2 rods; thence westerly, and parallel with said road N. 67, 80 rods to a point two rods south of the north line of said Road No. 62; thence south 2 rods to the north line of said Road No. 62 and terminating thereat. Atd that that part of said Road No. 62 between the above described points be vacated. On motion the Clerk was instructed to notify the Overseer of Highways to open said Road. The bond of the Standard Bridge Co. of Omaha, \$100,000, covering their contract for the building of bridges in the County for the year beginning November 12, 1909, was examined and on motion approved and ordered placed on file. On motion the Treasurer was instructed to refund to L. P. Davis and to H. F. Feekin, each the sum of \$2.00, being the amount of Poll-tax assessed against each of them in 1909, and paid by them under protest for the reason that they are members of the Fire Department. On motion the Treasurer was instructed to refund to J. E. Moss the sum of \$1.80, being the amount of 1909 taxes paid by him under protest for the reason that he was illegally assessed on \$300.00 of building and loan stock. On motion the Treasurer was instructed to refund to Jake Schilz, of Coleman Precinct, the sum of \$2.25, being the amount of 1909 taxes paid by him under protest, for the reason that he was assessed twice on the same team of mules. On motion the Treasurer was instructed to refund to Roy Zlot the sum of \$6.48, being the amount of 1909 taxes paid by him under protest, for the reason that his furniture was assessed at \$50.00, when it should have been \$100.00. On motion the Treasurer was instructed to refund to the Lebanon Farmers' Co Operative Association the sum of \$5.41, being the amount paid by them under protest in their 1909 taxes, for the reason that they were assessed on \$50.00 of Grain and Live Stock, when this amount was already assessed in their Goods and Merchandise on hands. The Claim for 1909 Poll-tax refund, for \$2.00, of Albert Overlese, which was paid by him under protest, for the reason that he served in the regular army, was on motion rejected, as the law does not exempt him.
