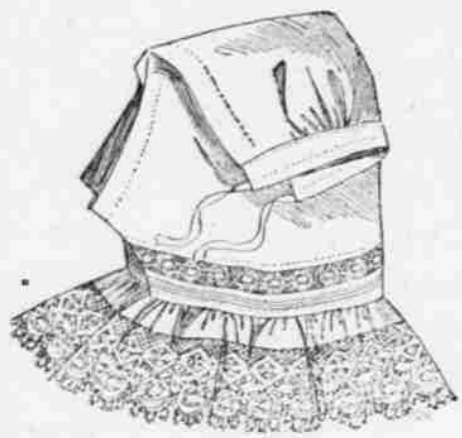

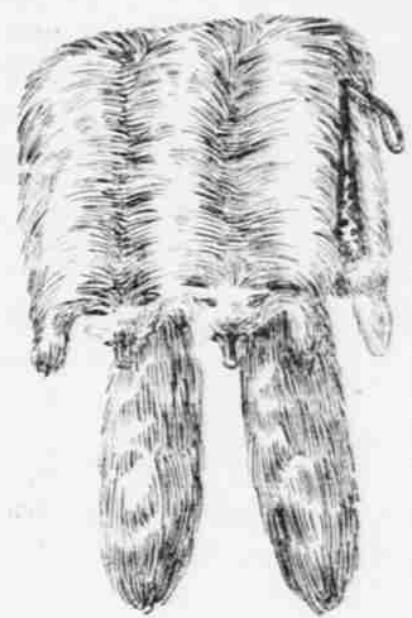

The show runs for a period of a couple of hours or more, and includes a juggling and spinning act, acrobats, wrestling by Gotch, offering a big forfeit to any one he fails to down in a quarter of an hour, and other features, in addition to Jeffries in his gymnasium act. This act includes shadow boxing, rope dancing, and illustrates a variety of exercises which the big fellow goes through daily to perfect his condition for the coming battle. The big fellow concludes with Berger, winding up the show.

COMBINATION HAS BEEN A BIG HIT.

Promoters who laughed at Frazee when he expended a great deal of money getting his athletic talent together, and predicted his financial defeat in the enterprise have stopped scoffing, for everywhere the combination has gone it has met with great success and played to crowded houses.
