Engineer Koll Buried Here.

The remains of William Koll were brought here, last Saturday, from Republican City, and interment was made in Riverview.

This closes a tragic life. Koll was terribly burned, November 27th, we are informed, in an accident near Salt Lake City, Utah, which finally resulted in his death.

The remains were first taken to his home in Republican City, where services were conducted.

Quite a large delegation of neighbors, friends and relatives accompanied the body here from Republican City.

Deceased leaves wife and one daughter, who was severely injured some years since on her father's engine, while he was then employed as a Burlington engineer.

The family is well known here, and they have the deepest sympathy of all in this last sorrow.

The Suit Failed.

In the case of the State of Nebraska vs. Nora Lee, first of the week, before County Judge Moore, the jury found the fair prisoner not guilty and released her.

Robert Jenkins was the prosecuting witness and a gold watch and chain were involved in the case, Robert claiming Nora had in her possession unlawfully and that it belonged to him. The jury didn't think that Robert made a good case, and he was assessed the costs in the prosecution.
