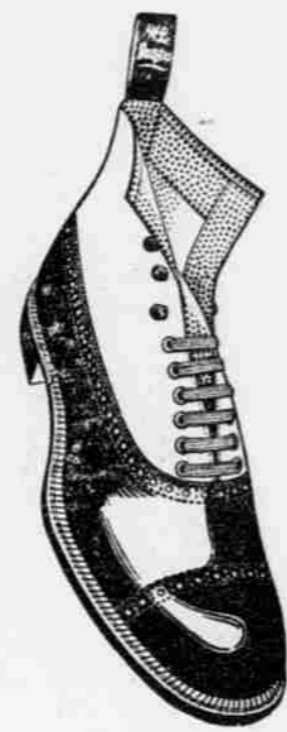

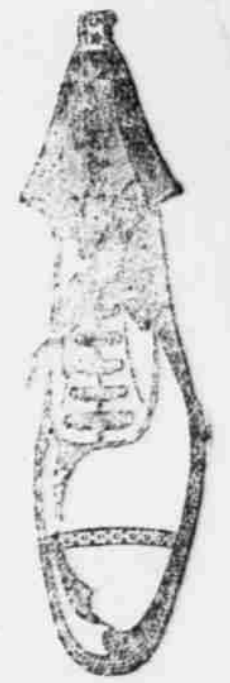

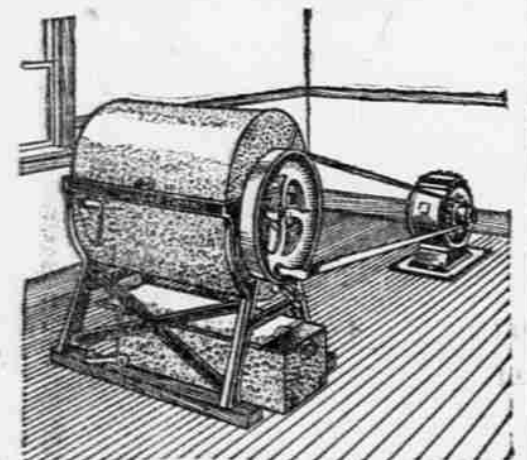

### County Commissioners' Proceedings.

McCook, Nebraska, Feb. 8, 1910.

The board of county commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Present, C. B. Gray, F. S. Lofton and Edward Sughrone, county commissioners, and Chas. Skalla, county clerk. The minutes of the meeting held on Feb. 1, 2, 3 and 4 were read and on motion approved.

The quarterly reports of H. I. Peterson, sheriff, for the 3rd and 4th quarters of 1909, were placed before the board, and it appearing from the county treasurer's receipt No. 402, that said H. I. Peterson has paid the full amount due the county for fees, excluding mileage, for 1908 and 1909, to-wit: \$263.80. The board ordered said report to be placed on file.

The following reports were placed before the board and on motion ordered filed: E. F. Osborn, deputy sheriff, October 1, 1908 to October 1, 1909.

E. F. Osborn, deputy sheriff, October 1, 1909, to January 6, 1910.

C. A. Rodgers, clerk of district court, for year ending December 31, 1909.

C. A. Rodgers, clerk of district court, for 2nd half 1910.

C. A. Rodgers, statement of sheriff's fees for 1908 and 1909 in district court.

J. M. Brown, justice of the peace, East Valley precinct, for 1909.

E. H. Hethcote, justice of the peace, Beaver precinct, for 1909.

J. S. LeHew, justice of the peace, Willow Grove precinct, for 1909.

J. C. Moore, county judge, report 1909.

The official bonds of Mitchell Young, as constable for Beaver precinct and of W. F. Miller, as overseer of district No. 19, were examined and on motion approved and ordered recorded and placed on file.

A motion was made by Lofton, that the hold-over bond of J. S. LeHew, filed on January 14, 1910, as justice of the peace for Willow Grove precinct be rejected, for the reason that there are two qualified and acting justices of the peace in said precinct. Roll call resulted as follows: Yay—Lofton, Sughrone, Gray. Motion carried unanimously.

The annual settlements of the following named road overseers were examined and on motion approved and ordered placed on file: J. L. Houghtland, overseer, district No. 2, Alliance precinct.

Henry Corcoran, overseer, district No. 6, Perry precinct.

Herman Reiners, overseer, district No. 13, Bondville precinct.

W. P. Wood, overseer, district 15, Driftwood precinct.

Samuel Ellis, overseer, district No. 17, Gerver precinct.

C. R. Newberry, overseer, district No. 18, Danbury precinct.

F. W. McCashland, overseer, district No. 20, Lebanon precinct.

In excess of the amounts given on their time books, and that the board asks them to show cause for such discrepancy. Motion carried unanimously.

On motion the county treasurer was instructed to refund to Albert Armstrong the sum of \$2.00, being the amount of 1909 poll tax assessed against him in McCook and paid by him under protest, for the reason that he is a member of the Nebraska National Guard.

On motion the county treasurer was instructed to refund to J. A. Shepherd the sum of \$2.00, being the amount of 1909 poll tax assessed against him in McCook and paid by him under protest, for the reason that he has been a member of the fire department for 7 years.

The claim for poll tax refund of W. G. Jones of McCook for \$2.00 of 1907 tax, paid under protest, for the reason that he was 50 years of age in 1907, was on motion rejected, as the county attorney held that he was subject to poll tax for that year, unless he was 50 years old before April 1st.
