A Big Junior Normal Week.

Next week is the regular institute week for Hitchcock and Red Willow counties. The Junior Normal enrollment now is larger than last year for full term students. With the advent of institute attendance, next week, it is expected that the total enrollment will outstrip last year by several.

The special features of the institute work will be illustrated lectures in geography by Prof. N. A. Bengston of the University of Nebraska and expert work in penmanship and drawing by Prof. G. E. Weaver of Perry college.

Tuesday evening, Prof. Bengston will give a lecture illustrated with stereopticon at the high school auditorium at 8:30. The public is cordially invited to attend. Admission free.

Friday evening, Prof. Weaver will give a chalk talk lecture. He is an artist with the chalk, being ambidextrous—drawing pictures with both hands at once. As before, the public is cordially invited to this lecture at the high school auditorium—free of charge.

Friday afternoon, June 17, at 2:30 o'clock, the Red Willow county eighth grade graduating exercises will take place at the high school auditorium. Inspector G. S. Gregory of Lincoln will deliver the class address. A strong musical program has also been provided for this occasion. There will be forty-two graduates of the rural schools. All are cordially invited. No admission fee.

All of this, with the regular Junior Normal work besides, will make a regular educational chautauqua of inspiration for teachers and those interested in school affairs.

St. Albans' New Rectory.

It is to be 28x28 feet in dimensions, two stories high, having on the first floor the kitchen, dining room, living room, and reception room. On the second floor will be four bed rooms and a bath.
