Burlington Annual Figures.
 Chicago, Sept. 23. — The annual report of the conditions of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad for the year ending June 30, last, shows a total operating revenue of \$87,859,517, a total operating expense of \$63,010,964 and a net operating revenue of \$24,858,552. Outside operations, including losses in restaurant and dining car service and taxes, cut the net operating revenue to \$22,481,036. The total operating revenue is more than \$9,250,000 greater than that of the year ending June 30, 1909.
