**Portugal and Her Deposed Monarch**

PORTUGAL, on which the eyes of the world are now focused owing to the revolutionary outbreak there, is 395 miles long from north to south by an average width of 100 miles and contains an area of 21,000 square miles. It is a matter of common knowledge that Portugal, alone of all the kingdoms that formerly made up the Iberian peninsula, should maintain its independence of the all absorbing Castilian. A Portuguese can leave his country by land only by passing through Spanish territory, which surrounds him on the north and east. Portugal's area is much less than his neighbor; but, on the other hand, its present colonial possessions are larger. It has never had such wars to fight for them as Spain had in Cuba and the Philippines, and it has never had trouble with Uncle Sam.

Lisbon (Lisba, as it is called in the native language) is declared by a number of foreign writers to be the most beautiful city in Europe, with the exception of Naples and Constantinople. This praise is in reference to the approach by sea. The Portuguese have a saying that "he who has not seen Lisba does not know what beauty is." It is a clean city, said by some authorities to be one of the cleanest in all Europe, something that cannot be said of many Spanish towns—hardly even of Madrid, except right in the center of the city.

It was on Feb. 1, 1908, that Manuel unexpectedly became king of Portugal.

That very morning as Duke of Beja, an unconsidered boy, he stepped into his father's carriage. He was not heir to the throne. By the entourage of the court he was looked upon as a prig and a bookworm, quite different from his colossal, good humored, blustering father, who might have stepped out of a Frans Hals canvas.

Many of the onlookers cheered the burly king—the "laughing cavalier" of monarchy—as he lolled back in the carriage and curled his moustache. A young equestrian leaped on the door for a moment and whispered a joke to the crown prince, the dashing and popular Duke of Braganza, but Manuel sat with his back to the horses and passed almost unnoticed.

A few minutes later as the royal carriage drove past Arsenal street a group of anarchists who had been skulking at the corner suddenly sprang at the carriage. One of them actually clambered on the hood. The tragedy that followed is remembered by every one. A hail of revolver bullets overwhelmed the royal party. The king rolled to the bottom of the carriage dead, and the crown prince fell across his body, also dead. Queen Amelie bravely sprang up and endeavored to shield her husband and sons when the firing began. After they had fallen she seized her only surviving son, Manuel, in her arms. He was wounded in the face and arm. He drove back to the palace a king.

The full name of the youthful ruler of Portugal is Manuel Maria Philippe Carlos Amalia Luis Miguel Gonzaqua Xavier Francisco d'Assisi Eugenio. He is a handsome young fellow and devoted to his mother, Queen Amelie, by whose counsel he has been guided in the recent crisis. He was born in Lisbon on Nov. 15, 1889, educated under private instructors, entered the navy at fifteen as midshipman and rose to be lieutenant.

The young king of Portugal has been educated almost entirely under the direction of his mother, Queen Amelie. During the first ten years of his life he had absolutely no instructor except the queen. When the lad was ten the Marquis Lietno was appointed to teach him mathematics, the queen continuing her training in languages and literature.
