Fifty roads were concerned in the controversy and the increase in wages granted was on a 10 per cent basis, 75,000 employes being benefitted. Taken in conjunction with the settlement effected by the same roads to their engineers a short time ago, the agreements provide a total of \$9,000,000 increase in wages for the employes of those lines within a week. A total of 20,000 conductors and 55.000 trainmen will be bene fitted by the new agreement.
