The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session. Present: F. S. Lofton, Edward Sughrone and W. N. Rogers, county commissioners; Chas. D. Ritchie, county attorney, and Chas. Skalla, county clerk.  
The minutes of the meeting held May 24th and of the special meeting held June 14th were read and on motion approved.  
A motion was made by Rogers, seconded by Sughrone, that the board of county commissioners at their meeting on the 5th day of July, 1911, will reconsider the action taken by them on the 14th day of June, 1911, on the claim of the Audit and Bond company of America, for \$602.80 for the checking of the various officers, railroad fare and expenses, and that said Audit and Bond company of America be given notice of said intended reconsideration. Motion carried unanimously.  
On motion the county treasurer was instructed to refund to J. R. Stansberry the sum of \$9.12, being the amount of 1910 taxes paid by him under protest for the reason improvements assessed in 1910 on lot 4 in block 7, 7th addition to McCook, were built after April 1st, 1910.
