He will not issue a formal statement at this time announcing his candidacy, but may do so shortly after his return home at the adjournment of con



gress. The determination of Mr. Norris to seek the seat of Senator Brown in the senate means he will either leave the house for the upper branch of congress, or retire to private life. He is willing, it is understood, to allow some other man in his district seek the congressional nomination




