Ritchie, county attorney and Chas. Skalla, county clerk. The board commenced the examination of the accounts of C. A. Rodgers, clerk of the district court, and after a careful examination find that he has earned and received as fees from January 1st, 1911, to June 30th, 1911, both inclusive, the sum of \$722.88.
