**PUBLIC SCHOOLS OPEN**  
**TUESDAY, SEPT. 5.**

Patrons of the public schools will note that schools open Tuesday morning next at 9 o'clock. It is very desirable that all pupils in the city should enter promptly on the first day of school. All pupils are requested to come to the same rooms they were in at the close of school last year. Formal promotions will be made from the old rooms. At the East ward work will be given from the preparatory to the 6th grade inclusive. It may be necessary to make some shifts in the sixth grade work after school begins. School work from the preparatory to the fourth grade inclusive will be given at the West ward. Work from the seventh grade to twelfth, inclusive, will be given at the high school. An over flow room will be maintained at the high school building for first and second grades as registration conditions may warrant.

As in the past, Main street will be the dividing line between the East and West wards. Parents of new beginners are requested to have their children enrolled in school on or before October 2, as new classes will not be formed that time.
