McCook, Nebr., September 26, 1911. The Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Present: F. S. Lofton, Edward Sughroue and W. N. Rogers, county commissioners. Chas. L. Ritchie county attorney, and Chas. Skalla, county clerk.

The minutes of the meeting held September 12th were read and on motion approved.

A motion was made by Rogers, seconded by Sughroue, that the county clerk be instructed to advertise for 4 consecutive weeks for sealed bids for grading on the through county road, on Contracts No. 6, 7, 16 and 17, according to the specifications drawn by the county surveyor. Bids to be called for on same terms as in first advertisement for bids, in June, 1911. These bids are to be opened by the county board on October 24th, 1911, at 2 o'clock p. m. and must be filed by 12 o'clock, at noon, of said day. The board reserves the right to reject any or all bids. Motion carried unanimously.

**McCook Federal Building**  
Supervising Architect Asks for Information as to Requirements.  
Postmaster Cone is in receipt of blanks from the office of the supervising architect in Washington, D. C., seeking for advance and preliminary information concerning McCook's proposed federal building.

It will be recalled that the proposed building has been authorized by congress at a cost of \$85-000.00. It is expected that the informality of making the appropriation will be attended to during the approaching regular term of congress.

As the matter of appropriation is only a regular step in the progress of such work after the building has been authorized, the supervising architect's office is taking up now the work of planning for the building and it is expected that within a few months plans and specifications will be prepared by the government and submitted to the treasury department for approval.

The proposed building will be built to accommodate three departments of the government's work, namely, the post office, the judiciary, and the department of animal industry — a department growing also in importance and which will have quarters in the new building commensurate with the work and other requirements.

At this time the government is especially making inquiries covering the requirements for the postoffice in the matter of all facilities covering all the departments of business, including postal savings, city and rural delivery, money order, registration and the usual business of the post office proper.

Besides the second story will be given over largely to the federal court and to the department of animal industry.

Work on the new building will doubtless be inaugurated early next summer.
