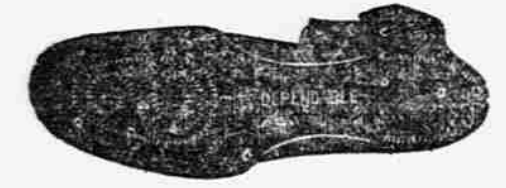

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' PROCEEDINGS.

McCook, Nebraska, October 3, 1911. The Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Present: F. S. Lofton, Edward Sughroue and W. N. Rogers, county commissioners, Chas. D. Ritchie county attorney, and Chas. Skalla, county clerk.

The minutes of the meetings held September 26th, 1911, were read and on motion approved.

A motion was made by Rogers, seconded by Sughroue, that the county treasurer be instructed to apportion money now on hand in the Willow Grove precinct ditch bond fund, among all the school districts embraced in Willow Grove precinct and in sections 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 in Valley Grange precinct, the territory that has paid said ditch bond, at the ratio as based on the assessed valuation of each district on April 1st, 1911, and all monies to be collected on this fund here after to be divided on the same basis the 1st of each month, this money to be transferred to general fund of each school district in the territory mentioned. Motion carried unanimously.

A motion was made by Sughroue, as follows: Be it resolved by the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Red Willow, State of Nebraska, that said board deems it necessary, owing to the large amount of pauper claims, to levy a tax for the purpose of creating a fund, with which to purchase land, erect and furnish buildings, there on suitable for a poor farm. Said tax to be levied for the years 1912, 1913 and 1914 only, and at the rate of 1 mill on each dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of Red Willow county, which is 2 cents on each \$100.00 of actual valuation. And said tax shall be in addition to all other taxes which said board is authorized to levy for county purposes.

Be it further resolved, that an election be called to be held on the 7th day of November, A. D. 1911, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m. of said day at the voting places of the several voting precincts of said county, where the general election for the year 1911 shall be holden. Said election to be for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said county a proposition to vote a special tax, which proposition and notice of said election shall be given and published in the words as follows:

NOTICE OF SPECIAL TAX ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given of the qualified electors of the County of Red Willow, in the State of Nebraska, that upon the order of the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Red Willow in the State of Nebraska, an election will be held on the seventh day of November, A. D. 1911, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m. of said day at the voting places in the several voting precincts of said county, where the general election for the year 1911 shall be holden, for the purpose of voting on the following proposition, which is hereby submitted to the qualified electors of said county, to-wit:

"Shall the County Board of the County of Red Willow in the State of Nebraska, levy a tax for the years 1912, 1913 and 1914, for the purpose of creating a fund, with which to purchase land, erect and furnish buildings there on suitable for a poor farm and to put into operation and defray the actual expenses of such poor farm, said tax to be levied for the years 1912, 1913 and 1914, and at the rate of one mill on each dollar of the assessed valuation of the taxable property of said county, which tax shall be in addition to the taxes, which said County Board is authorized to levy for county purposes.

Said proposition as submitted on the ballots to be:

For a one mill tax for a poor farm

Against a one mill tax for a poor farm

ers of the County of Red Willow, in the State of Nebraska, this 3rd day of October, A. D., 1911.

The roll call was ordered and resulted as follows:

Yea: Lofton, Sughroue, Rogers, 3. Nay: None. Motion was declared carried.

A motion was made by Sughroue, that the county clerk be instructed to advertise said "NOTICE OF SPECIAL TAX ELECTION" by publishing it in the legal paper from now until the election, and to place said proposition in the form as designated in the foregoing resolution, upon the ballots to be used at the general election for the year 1911.

The roll call was ordered and resulted as follows:

Yea: Lofton, Sughroue, Rogers, 3. Nay: None. Motion was declared carried.

A motion was made by Rogers seconded by Sughroue, that, whereas 95 voters of this county have petitioned the county board to submit to the qualified voters of the county at the general election to be held November 7, 1911, the following proposition: "For or Against Bounties on Wolves, Wild Cats and Coyotes." Be it hereby resolved that said request be granted and the county clerk be instructed to place upon the ballots to be used at the general election to be held November 7, 1911, in the county of Red Willow, State of Nebraska, the following proposition:

For bounties on wolves, wildcats and coyotes. . . . []
Against bounties on wolves, wildcats and coyotes. . . . []
Motion carried unanimously.

A motion was made by Rogers, seconded by Sughroue, that whereas a petition of 26 voters of Road District No. 18, being Danbury precinct, has been presented to this board, asking this board to levy a special tax of four mills on the taxable property of said road district, as a special road tax, and whereas this board has no authority to levy any special taxes in excess of the amount this board is authorized to levy for county purposes, unless authorized to do so by a vote of the people, be it hereby resolved, that the proposition of voting a special road tax of four mills on the taxable property of Road District No. 18 for the year 1912, be submitted to the qualified electors of said road district at the election to be held November 7, 1911, in said road district, and the county clerk is hereby instructed to place on the ballots to be used at the general election to be held on November 7, 1911, in Road District No. 18, (Danbury precinct) of the county of Red Willow, the following proposition:

For a special road tax of 4 mills, in 1912

Against a special road tax of 4 mills, in 1912

Motion carried unanimously.

A motion was made by Sughroue, seconded by Rogers, that the county clerk be instructed to submit to the qualified electors of any road district of the county of Red Willow at the general election to be held on November 7, 1911, the proposition "For or Against a special road tax in 1912 to be levied by the county board on the taxable property of the respective districts, by placing said proposition on the ballots to be used at the general election to be held on November 7, 1911, in the respective road districts of said county, that may be petitioned by at least one-fourth of the voters of said precinct, as based on the votes cast at the general election held in November, 1910, request that said proposition be submitted to the voters of their district at the coming election, and stating the number of mills to be voted, providing said petition is filed by at least Monday, October 23rd, 1911. Motion carried unanimously.

A Crowded House.

The temperance address by Rev. Moore of Edgar in the Methodist church, Sunday night, filled that structure to overflowing. Rev. Moore simply covered the financial feature of the question, and that he did powerfully and satisfactorily and with convincing force many will admit. His figures utterly demolished the great fallacy that the liquor traffic pays. In the presence of his showing of figures one can stand but appalled at the monstrous commercial loss alone of the liquor business, and to be filled with utter wonderment that the people should encourage so destructive and woeful a business in the face of its almost unbelievable loss. The Baptist and Congregational churches of the city closed for this union service. Rev. Moore used some special features in illustrating his lecture which added to its effectiveness—measures, weights, a map and 200 silver dollars, thus clinching with the eye the figures which fairly stunned the intellect.

A Queer Case.

A man by the name of Arthur Chelf from St. Joseph, Mo., created some excitement, last Friday evening, by falling in a fit before Sutton's jewelry store. He was carried in the store and upon reviving was decidedly obstreperous and hard to handle for a while. He afterwards became calm enough to give his name and residence, and stated he had no recollection of happenings since the previous Wednesday, when he was in St. Joseph. Phone communication was established with St. Joseph people and his statements were corroborated in part. He has since been kept under guard, awaiting developments and further instructions. This morning, however, a telegram from the sheriff of St. Joseph ordered his arrest, which complicates the case somewhat.
