seconded by Sughroue, that whereas the road leading from the City of McCook, and described as follows:

Commencing at a point in the center of Road No. 218 on the west line of the southwest quarter of the southeast quarter of section 30, township 3, range 29, in Red Willow county, which point is 175 feet south of the center line of the C. B. & Q. R. R. right of way, running thence north 60 degrees east in continuation of said road No. 218, 80 feet, thence north 84 degrees 30 minutes east 500 feet, thence north 53 degrees 30 minutes east 84 feet, thence north 20 degrees east 205 feet, to the city limits of the City of McCook, and terminating thereat, intersecting with the street of said City of McCook, at said point,"

Has never been established as a public road, but has been recognized as a public road by the public and used as such, also recognized as a road by the owners of the land on each side of said road, at a width of 66 feet, said owners having filed claims for damages and received pay for such damages, several years past.

Be it hereby resolved that we declare said road as a public road to be known as Road No. 442, at a width of 66 feet, forever hereafter.

Motion carried unanimously.

Notice to Stallion Owners.

The 1911 Stallion Registration Law requires all males, pure bred cross bred, grade or jack to be examined by a state inspector.

An inspector will be at the Commercial hotel in McCook, 10:20 a. m. to 5:05 p. m., on October 19, and at the best hotel in Indianola, 8:00 to 9:58 a. m. on October 19, for the purpose of inspecting all stallions and jacks in vicinity of respective towns named. Horses in the vicinity of Perry and Banksville should be brought to McCook for inspection. The inspection will cost \$5.00 for each animal and will begin at 9 a. m. each day. Copies of the law may be had from W. R. Mellor, Secretary Nebraska Stallion Registration Board, Lincoln, Neb.
