## OBITUARY.

Jacob Long was born in Pennsylvania, January 6th, 1839. He moved with his father to Indiana when a small boy. From there he enlisted at the call of his country and served for three years in the civil war. He was married to Miss Millie McNeil and to them were born four children. They moved to Red Willow county, Nebraska, in 1876, in which county he lived until about three years ago, when he went back to Indiana, where he died on October 27th, 1911. About 45 years ago he united with the Methodist church. As a local preacher he did much to build up the cause of his Master, having organized the Box Elder and other churches. He had a stroke of paralysis, and was unable to speak for an hour, afterwards telling his son, "it was the happiest hour of his life." Two sons survive him, I. D. Long of Haigler, Nebraska, and Ronnie Long, of Brush, Colorado. The remains were buried in Riverview cemetery, McCook, Nebraska, October 30th, 1911.
