## Coal to Be Cheaper in McCook.

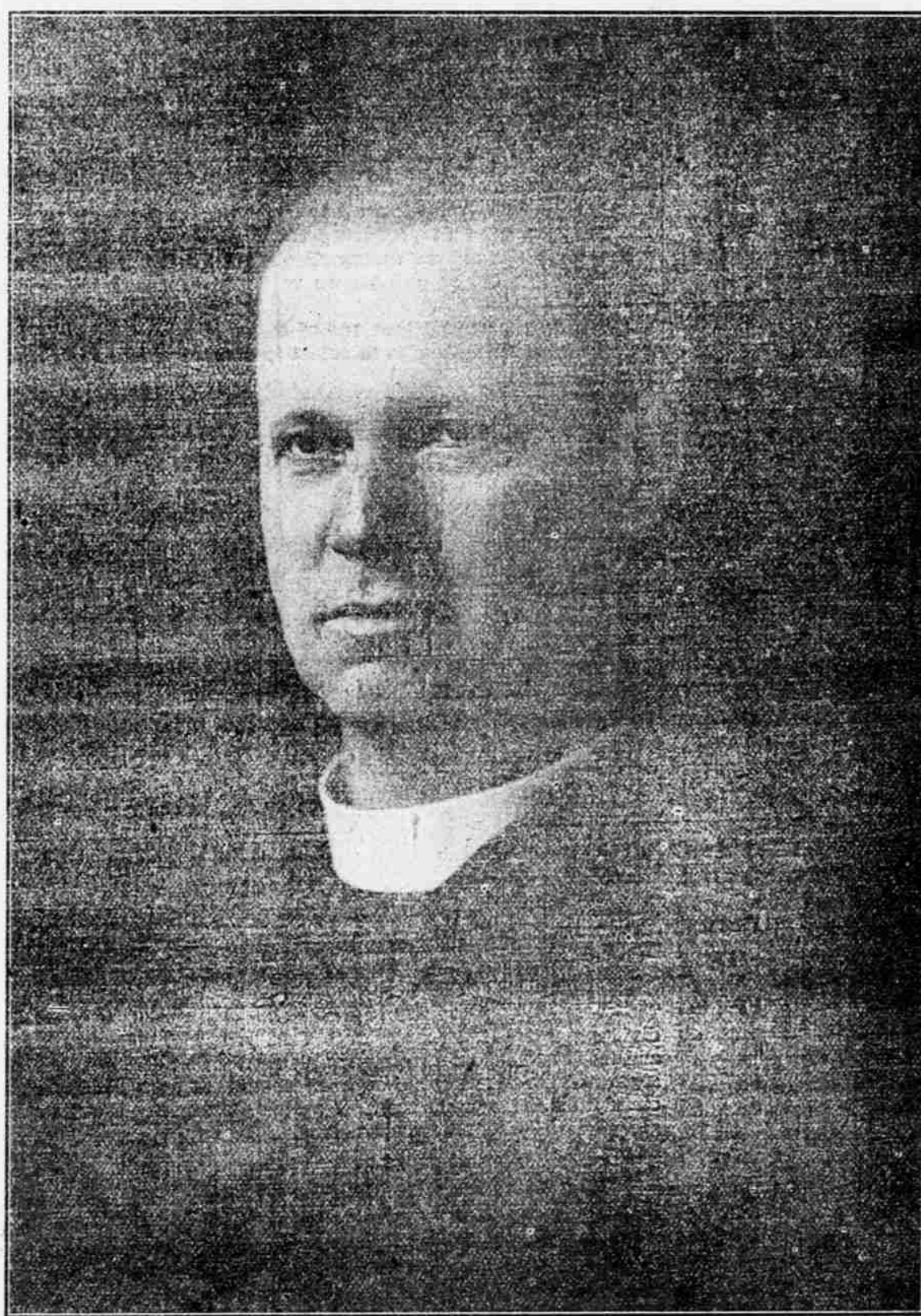
