The Domestic Science Faculty Organize.

On last Friday afternoon a number of ladies met in the superintendent's office in the Central school building. Supt. Davis discussed domestic science problems from the standpoint of the schools and showed the importance of making it a part of our high school course of study. The Crete plan was then explained and many questions regarding the working of the plan asked and answered. The ladies then decided to organize the Crete plan as outlined. Mrs. Dr. Fahnestock was then elected president of the domestic science faculty.

A second meeting has been called by the president for this Thursday afternoon at 3:30 when all the domestic science faculty are to meet and complete plans for the beginning of the work. The work will begin with the opening of the second semester.

Judging by the interest and enthusiasm displayed by the ladies and their excellent judgment in selecting for their leader a lady who was formerly a star student in the domestic science department of our state university the success of the plan seems to be assured.

Night School.

Our night school now has an enrollment of eighteen. All but one of whom find it impossible

to attend the day school and this one is an ambitious boy who feels that he is not as far a long in schoolwork as he should be, and is trying to make an extra grade in the night school while carrying on his regular day school work. The students include eleven boys and seven girls. They are doing various grades of work ranging from learning the English language to work in the 8th grade. The interest on the part of the pupils is simply ideal and it is safe to say that in no part of our schools is there more keen purposeful study than in our night school. Mrs. Douglass, the teacher, works with enthusiasm and in such a way that her boys and girls of the night school are simply the best in town. The school is open from seven to nine at the Central building and citizens are invited to drop in and inspect the work. There is still room for others to enroll and the tuition is free to all in the district of school age.
