IMPORTANT LITIGATION.

Suits Filed Against the McCook Irrigation Company.

January 30th there was filed in the office of the clerk of the district court in this city, a suit against the McCook Irrigation and Water Power Co., by Isaiah H. Wasson, which promises to open up one of the biggest items of litigation this county has witnessed in some time.

The suit primarily is for a restraining order against the company, to restrain the company from shutting off water from the plaintiff's land.

The papers filed allege that the McCook Irrigation and Water Power Co. is now asking discriminatory prices for water and for water rights. Alleging that while some land owners along the ditch have paid but \$1,000 for a perpetual right for 160 acres, which gives one cubic foot of water continuously during the irrigating season, the company now demands \$35.00 per acre for water, together with taxes and maintenance, or practically five times more than others received the same service for.

Suits have also been filed by Mrs. L. J. Burtless and F. S. Lofton, while several other suits are in abeyance.

This is a matter of vast and invaluable importance to many farmers and land-owners along the ditch, many of whom, aside from Mr. W. H. Ferguson of Lincoln and Mr. J. E. Kelley of our city, who practically control the ditch, will be effected in a most damaging manner, if this matter stands the tests of the courts.
