Easter Services at the Churches

Methodist.

An appropriate sermon by Pastor Lewis and special anthems by the choir were features of the morning service; besides the floral decorations. The main audience chamber was well filled. But in the evening the auditors utterly overflowed the entire capacity of the church, some using standing room, others not attempting to gain admission. The occasion was a special Easter program by the children of the Sunday school. Their program consisted of a harmonious and appropriate selection of songs by the Sunday school choir, and individual children, and of dialogues, recitations, etc., altogether forming a most interesting entertainment, given by the children in a manner to captivate everybody. The Sunday school collection, special for the day, amounted to \$25. There was a wealth of floral decoration—Easter lilies, palms, carnations, and other potted and cut flowers.

Episcopal.

Here obtained the regular program of Easter day, beginning with Holy Communion at eight o'clock in the morning. The ten o'clock Sunday school was followed by Holy Communion and sermon at 11. There was also a service and address in the evening at 8 o'clock. The special choral music gave evidence of the preparations made for the music of the day in its excellence and grade. Rev. Goldsmith added sermons appropriate to the church's greatest festival, and flowers in seasonal beauty added the final touch to altar and other interior decorations.

Baptist.

At this church the eye was especially challenged by the profuse loveliness of the flowers displayed in potted plants, cut flowers, etc. Besides special preparations were effectively carried into execution by the choir in appropriate anthems for the services; while Pastor McBride laid eloquent emphasis, in his sermons, upon the theme of the day, the central and basic thought of christianity—the resurrection and immortal life.

Congregational.

At the morning services the note of emphasis was the presence of the members of Saint John Commandery No. 16, Knight Templar, in a body, the Knights, as in their annual custom marching from their temple in organization, in charge of Knight Wilcox. Rev. Bayne's utterances on the sermon topic, "The Builder and the Soldier," received close attention and complimentary comment from Knights and others for its depth and breadth and eloquent delivery. The special music by the choir was of a high order at both morning and evening services and was rendered with a skill and finish well known and enjoyed. An appropriate display of flowers and potted plants of the season gave additional tone to the services of the day.

Confirmation Services.

Easter Sunday was a festival occasion for the German Lutheran population of McCook. Three catechumens, John Baston, Anna Hoffman and Marie Gruenwald, who had received catechetical instructions during the past year, were examined and confirmed. The examination of the pupils was conducted by the Rev. O. Richert and the confirmation services proper by the senior pastor, the Rev. G. Wockenfuss. The church was beautifully decorated and services were well attended. The singing of two choirs which were directed by Mrs. G. Wockenfuss, the organist, was helpful in making the services interesting and impressive.

Catholic.

At St. Patrick's church, the foremost feast of the church was given expression in the usual three masses, Sunday morning, with appropriate sermons by Rev. William Patten, O. M. I., and music of the day by the choir. As customary nature's floral beauty added their tints and fragrance to the handsome decoration of altar, etc. These services attracted large audiences to their solemn and impressive performance.

Should Include Nebraska.

Eastern automobilists are arranging for an auto tour across the country, replacing the Glidden tour of past years, which has been discontinued. It is estimated that 100 cars and possibly 300 people will be included in this tour. But the vital point in this matter is the fact that the route so far adopted does not include Nebraska—but runs from New York to Denver via Kansas City. Nebraska is ignored, notwithstanding her roads compare favorably with those of any of the middle western states.

The question of changing this itinerary is being taken up with the New York end by the Nebraska State Automobile Association and other associations, and it is hoped to secure a change, including Nebraska.

Commercial clubs of the state will be asked to cooperate with auto associations in bringing about this highly desirable end. It would be a rare opportunity for Nebraskans to show their state in its true light and color to eastern people who need the illumination.

A Live Norris Club Is Formed

The formation of a Norris club was completed, end of week, for the purpose of giving a vigorous expression by the people of Congressman Norris' home town to his candidacy for the nomination to the office of United States senator on the Republican ticket.

A Barnett was chairman of the preliminary meeting called in the city hall for that purpose and J. C. Schobel was its secretary.

The result of the election of officers was as follows: L. W. McConnell, president; C. L. Fahnestock, vice president; J. E. Ludwick, secretary; F. A. Pennell treasurer.

An advisory committee was named composed of the following gentlemen: H. P. Sutton, J. E. Kelley, Worth Humphrey, G. E. Thompson and M. Lawritson.

On the finance committee are: H. C. Clapp, F. A. Pennell, E. D. Perkins and Elmer Kay.

How Shall We Manage Them? All voters interested in the welfare of our state hospitals, penitentiary, reform institutions, etc. are urged to take an active interest in the adoption of Amendment No. 3 on the ballot this year, entitled "A Proposed Amendment to the Constitution of Nebraska creating Board of Commissioners for State Institutions."

The adoption of this amendment will have the effect of placing the control of these institutions in the hands of a Board which will have for its object the placing of superintendents and employees in the institutions on the merit system. This will be in contradistinction to the method heretofore in vogue in Nebraska where by the institutional positions have been looked upon as perquisites to be dealt out in form of rewards for those who were most active politically. In other states it has long been recognized that as nearly as possible the appointments should be governed by merit and that non-partisan control contributes to the efficiency of management, and renders the conduct of such institutions more economical than where frequent changes in administration are made for political or other reasons. Amendment No. 3 as already pointed out offers a solution for this difficulty in Nebraska and should have the vote and active support of every one interested in the conduct of our state institutions.

Preached Funeral Sermon. Rev. M. S. Satchell, formerly of Box Elder, came on on delayed No. 3, Friday morning, on his way up to Palestine, where he was called by the death of H. B. Wales, whose funeral service he conducted on Saturday. Mr. Wales formerly for years lived in Coleman precinct, this county, and will be remembered by many Tribune readers as one of the leading citizens of that part of this county.
