ORDINANCE NO. 214.

An ordinance to amend section one of ordinance numbered 179 of the Revised and Compiled Ordinances of the City of McCook, Nebraska, passed and approved the 17th day of July, 1908, and to repeal said original section one of said ordinance 179 and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of McCook, Nebraska:

Section 1. That section one of ordinance 179 of the Revised and Compiled Ordinances of the City of McCook, Nebraska, passed and approved the 17th day of July, 1908, be and it hereby is amended to read as follows:

Section 1. For the purpose of raising revenue, there is hereby levied a license tax in the amount provided by this ordinance, on each and every occupation or business hereinafter mentioned, carried on or conducted within the City of McCook, Red Willow county, Nebraska, and each and every firm, co-partnership, association, or corporation carrying on or conducting any of said occupations or businesses within the City of McCook, shall pay to the treasurer of said City of McCook annually, on the second Monday in May in each year, (and in case of saloons, billiard halls and bowling alleys, before the issuance of a license), after the passage and approval of this ordinance, a license tax on such occupation or business, as follows:

- Billiard hall, for one table \$15 00
- Billiard hall, for each additional table 10 00
- Bowling alley 25 00
- Saloons 600 00
- Electric light company 25 00
- Gas company 10 00
- Telephone company 25 00
- Wholesale dealer in malt and spirituous liquors 20 00

Corporations engaged in the transportation of persons and goods by railroad, from the City of McCook, within the state of Nebraska, to places within said state, or within said state, from places within said state to said city, not including any business done to or from places without said state or for any department, agency or agent of the United States government or the State of Nebraska, or for any county or subdivision of the state of Nebraska or its officers as such, or any business which is interstate business 50 00

Express companies, or agencies for express companies taking or receiving packages, goods or property from any person or persons in the City of McCook, and transmitting such packages, goods or property by express from said city, within the state of Nebraska, to places within said state, or receiving within said city, packages, goods and property transmitted by express within said state from places within said state to persons within said state from places within said state to persons within said city, not including any business done to or from places without said state or for any department, agency or agent of the United States government to the state of Nebraska, or for any county or subdivision of the state of Nebraska or its officers as such, or any business which is interstate commerce 50 00

Telegraph companies, or agencies for telegraph companies, receiving messages in this city from persons in this city, and transmitting the same by telegraph from this city, within this state, to places and persons within this state, and receiving within this city messages by telegraph transmitted within this state from persons and places within this state, and delivering the same to persons within this city, not including any business done to or from places without said state or for any department, agency or agent of the United States

government of the state of Nebraska, or for any county or subdivision of the state of Nebraska or its officers as such, or any business which is interstate commerce 25 00

Section 2. Said original section one of said ordinance number 179 as the same now exists, and any and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

ORDINANCE NO. 215.

An ordinance to amend Section 6 of Ordinance numbered 140 of the Revised and Compiled Ordinances of the City of McCook, Nebraska, passed and approved March 4th, 1908, and entitled: "An Ordinance to Provide for the License, Regulation and Sale of Intoxicating, Malt, Vinous, Mixed, Spirituous and Fermented Liquors and to Provide a Penalty for the Violation Thereof, Also to Provide for a Hearing before the Mayor and Council in Cases of Violation of Such Ordinance, and for the Revoking, Cancelling and Annulling of Such License by the Mayor and Council, if it Shall be Found Upon Such Hearing That Said Ordinance Has Been Violated, Also to Repeal Ordinance No. 72 and Ordinance No. 8 of the Ordinances of the City of McCook;" to repeal said original section six of said ordinance numbered 140 as the same now exists; to repeal said ordinance No. 72; to repeal said ordinance No. 8; and to repeal any and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of McCook, Nebraska:

Section 1. That Section six of Ordinance numbered 140 of the Revised and Compiled Ordinances of the City of McCook, Nebraska, passed and approved March 4th, 1908, and entitled as set forth in the title of this ordinance, be, and it hereby is, amended to read as follows:

"Section 6. Before said license shall be granted, the applicant shall pay to the treasurer of the City of McCook, the occupation tax prescribed by ordinance, and shall also pay to said treasurer for the support of the school district of the city of McCook, in Red Willow county, Nebraska, the sum of six hundred dollars, which occupation tax and sum of six hundred dollars, shall be in full for the license for one year. The applicant shall take the city treasurer's receipts for said amounts in duplicate, and file one copy of each receipt with the city clerk before the license shall issue, and the city treasurer shall credit to the account of the school district of the City of McCook, all moneys now in his hands or which may hereafter come into his hands (otherwise than for said occupation tax), from any license heretofore issued and hereafter to be issued for the sale of malt, spirituous and vinous liquors within the city of McCook, which money shall constitute a school fund and be used for the sole use and benefit of said school district."

Section 2. Said original section six of said ordinance number 140 as the same now exists, ordinance number 72 and ordinance number 8 of the ordinances of the city of McCook; and any and all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

Section 2. Said original section take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

THE BEST KIND OF POULTRY

Agricultural Department Gives the Farmers Valuable Pointers.

The general purpose of poultry, such as the Plymouth Rocks, Wyandotts, Rhode Island Reds and Orpingtons, according to a late bulletin of the United States Department Agriculture, should be kept on the farm, rather than small egg breeds or small mongrel stock. It should also be remembered that dark-plumaged varieties do not as a rule look as well when dressed as poultry of other colors.

Usually more interest is taken with a flock of fowls that are of the same breed and color and it is an established fact that such a flock produces a more uniform product, which invariably secures to the owner higher prices than can be derived from the product of a mongrel flock.

As soon as the hatching season is over all male birds should be marketed, they having no influence whatever, on the number of eggs laid, and eggs produced by flocks composed of females only keep much better than eggs from hens that are allowed to run with males.

As soon as the cockerels weigh three-quarters of a pound they should be penned for 10 or 12 days and fed all they will eat of corn chop or wet wash composed of two parts corn meal, one part bran, and one part low-grade flour. If this mixture can be dampened with skim milk it will add much to its fattening and bleaching qualities. Birds that are fattened should be fed in troughs rather than in litter, as exercise at this time is not conducive to rapid gains in weight. The birds should be kept as quiet as possible.
