## Parties and the Referendum.

Have you considered the importance to your party and its candidates of adopting Amendment No. 1, the Initiative and Referendum, as a party measure at the coming primaries.

This measure carried in California, Colorado and Arkansas, the last states to vote upon it, by nearly four to one. The average in all states voting on it is nearly three to one. It is apparently still more popular in Nebraska. Will not such a measure, counting as part of the party ticket and having straight party votes counted for it, strengthen the party just as a popular candidate strengthens it?

Suppose your party voters should neglect to endorse this amendment at the primaries. Then straight party votes would be counted against it at the election. Your party would have its campaign to make handicapped by its opposition to a measure three-fourths of the people want. To support the Initiative and Referendum, as most of them would do, members of the party would have to scratch their party ticket. They would have to warn others not to vote a straight ticket. Would that be pleasant? Would it not be disastrous to party success?

A little effort on your part will insure your party against such a mishap. See that your party associates vote for Amendment No. 1 at the primaries. That will put the party right and save it a serious embarrassment in this year's campaign.

## Nebraska Amendments.

The following proposed amendments to the constitution (by their title) will be printed on each party ballot for the primary election to be held April 19th, 1912, and if a majority vote of any party is cast for either amendment it becomes a party measure and all straight votes cast by said party at the general election will be counted for the amendment. It requires a majority of all votes cast at general election to adopt an amendment.

No. 1. Initiative and Referendum.

No. 2. Fixing term of office and salaries for members of the Legislature.

No. 3. Board of Commissions of state institutions.

No. 4. Providing for general

## ROOSEVELT WINS IN ILLINOIS.

The political surprise of the week is the result of the Illinois primary election Tuesday, in which Roosevelt carried the state by over a hundred thousand majority, revised figures place the total at 115,000. This is a stinging rebuke to Limerism in Illinois, and places Colonel Roosevelt on the map for the presidential nomination in unmistakable terms.

Congressmen McKinley and Cannon were renominated, as was also Governor Deneen. If McKinley and Cannon go to national convention they will have to favor Roosevelt, as both their districts overwhelmingly voted for the colonel.

Lawrence Y. Sherman was the choice for United States senator and Cullom will undoubtedly be retired.

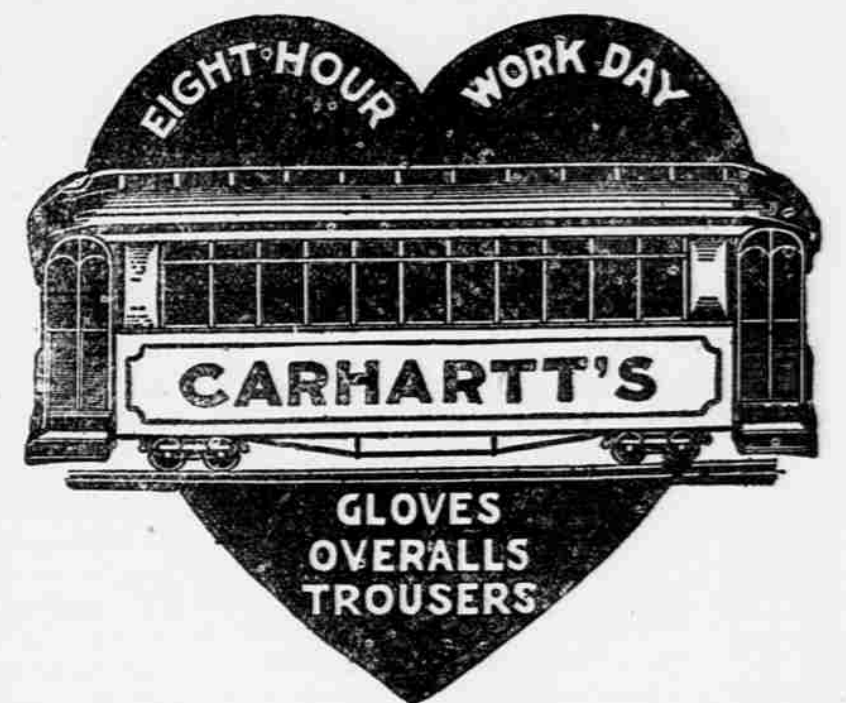

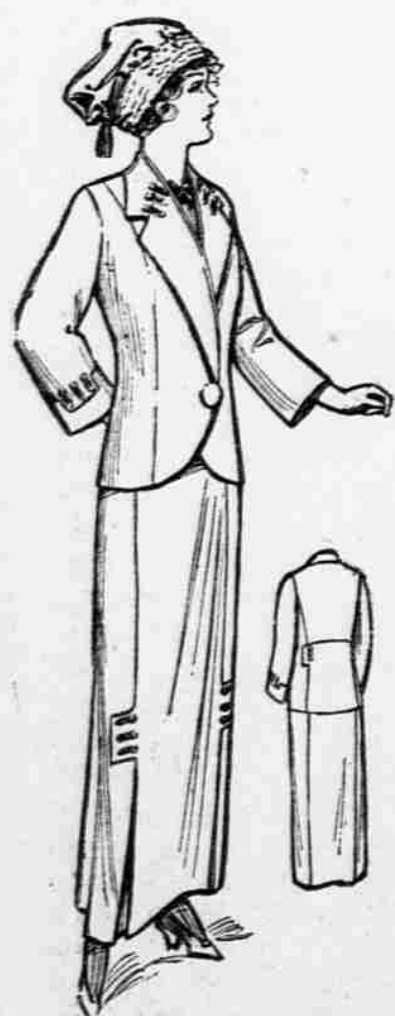
