The Stanley investigating committee makes a showing to the effect that the United States Steel Corporation controls 55 per cent of America's railroads. Of the \$18,000,000,000 aggregate railroad valuations the steel trust controls \$10,000,000,000, according to this committee.

### Norris Asks For Copy of Charges

Washington, April 23. — Representative Norris of Nebraska today introduced a resolution which would direct the president to transmit to the house a copy of any charges made against Judge Robert W. Archbald of the court of commerce. The resolution referred to charges that Judge Archbald figured in recent negotiations with the Erie railroad, over which he has judicial supervision. The resolution was referred to the judiciary committee.

National bank reports in print this week indicate favorable financial conditions over the country.

### Nebraska's Senatorial Policy.

Out of the recent primary developments the certainty that Nebraska's next United States senator will be either Congressman Geo. W. Norris or ex-Governor Ashton C. Shallenberger, nominated respectively on the republican and democratic tickets. No matter which is successful this means the retirement of Senator Norris Brown at the expiration of his term of office. It means furthermore that Nebraska is still adhering to its policy of constant change in its representation in the senate, and that the rule of a one-term senatorship is again to be applied. In all of the time since Nebraska was admitted to the union it has only once, and that in the case of General Mansfield, kept the same senator for two consecutive terms of service in contradistinction to other states that have managed to wield large influence in national affairs by pursuing precisely the opposite policy.

Nebraska's next United States senator will, it is true, be not inexperienced in the work of national legislation, for both Mr. Shallenberger and Mr. Norris have represented the Fifth Congressional district in the lower house, the latter having succeeded the former. Yet promotion from the house to the senate is not the same as retention of a senator term after term with its cumulative influence and prestige, to say nothing of enhanced strength and prestige of approving recognition by a constituency. So far as the senatorship is concerned, Nebraska's policy appears to be rotation in office, and it remains to be seen whether we will ever reach the point where permanency appeals to us as more desirable.—Omaha Bee.

### "All Men Are Liars."

When the psalmist said, "I said in my haste, all men are liars," he evidently referred to the sub-conscious or unconscious ears the scientists have lately analyzed and catalogued.

"Almost all training of the senses in children is subconscious and self-attained—generally in games and at play. A certain amount, also, of such training is done methodically in schools. Thus, there are two tests of the slight sense: the event test and the picture test. In the first a fully enacted scene is presented before a witness; and either immediately or soon after the event he is asked to recall and describe what he has seen. The picture test was first demonstrated in America at Clark University, by Prof. William Stern of Breslau, the pioneer in this field. By this test a picture is shown the subject for a brief period, after which he describes what he has seen, and is further questioned, as in the event experiment. It is now proposed to combine these in the moving picture test.

We may not here consider further these tests, except to observe how they demonstrate that people do not see a fraction of the things they confidently believe they see; and that one person's report of what he has seen almost never coincides, not even in the main, with another's report. And yet here is demonstrated no new thing. Historians and students of human affairs find hopeless discrepancies among eyewitnesses of a given battle or any other great event. Seeing is by no means always believing. The statement of a perception can be sound only when the latter has passed muster before dispassionate reason. And it is amazing how much an individual's temperament oftentimes colors a simple fact. The senses are by no means invariably a sure guide; the very best they can do is to appreciate phenomena. Reality, that is indubitable fact, is possible, only when emotionless reason, bringing memory and experience to bear upon the perception conveyed to the cerebrum, has given judgment. — Scientific American.

### County Contest.

The following prizes are offered boys in each county where a county contest is held under the direction of the county superintendent:

- 1st prize, \$10.00 in cash
- 2nd prize, \$5.00 in cash.
- 3rd prize, \$3.00 in cash.

### State Contest.

The winners at the county contest will compete for the state prizes. The Eastern division is composed of all counties east of a line drawn straight south from the western boundary of Knox county. The Western division is composed of all counties west of this line.

### Eastern Division.

- 1st prize \$50.00 in cash.
- 2nd prize, \$25.00 in cash.
- Ten third prizes of \$5.00 each

### Western Division.

- 1st prize, \$50.00 in cash.
- 2nd prize, \$25.00 in cash.
- Ten third prizes of \$5 each.

### The Rules.

1. Boy must be under twenty-one years of age.
2. All the work must be done by the boy.
3. Acre must be measured, husked and weighed in presence of two disinterested freeholders, residents of the county where the corn is grown. An affidavit must be sent to county superintendent and a copy to Superintendent of Agricultural Extension.
4. A complete record must be submitted on blanks furnished.
5. Ten ears of the corn (average selection) must be exhibited at the county contest.
6. The exhibits of the winners in each county will be sent to the state contest at Lincoln to compete for state prizes.
7. Boy must exhibit at county contest to entitle him to state prizes, and no county prizes will be awarded where there is no county contest.
8. In counties where the county superintendent does not hold county contest, growers are eligible to state prizes.
9. Entry is free, but boy must be an active member of a Nebraska Boys' Club. Write county superintendent for particulars. There is no membership fee.
10. Do not wait to organize a club in your locality now, but sign and mail the coupons below AT ONCE. This enters you for the contest. Then go to work and win the prize.

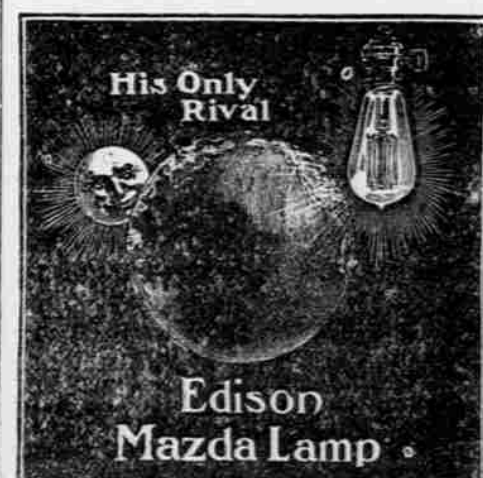
Notice is hereby given that The McCook Co-Operative Hospital Association has filed its articles of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of Nebraska, and in the office of the County Clerk of Red Willow county, Nebraska. The location of the principal office of the corporation shall be McCook, Nebraska, and the principal place for the transaction of its business shall be Red Willow county, Nebraska. The general nature of the business to be transacted by said corporation shall be: To equip, maintain and operate a hospital in Red Willow county, state of Nebraska; to receive donations of money or property of any description; to rent or purchase any real or personal property,

and to erect a building or buildings to be used in connection therewith; and to sell any property, real or personal, that may have come to the Association by gift or purchase, when such property has ceased to be of use for the purpose for which it was given or purchased.

The amount of capital stock authorized shall be \$25,000, divided into 5,000 shares of \$5.00 each which shall be subscribed for at not less than their par value and which shall be non-assessable, and no share shall be issued until fully paid for. The existence of this corporation began on March 4, 1912, and this corporation shall have perpetual succession. The highest amount of indebtedness or liability to which the corporation is at any time to subject itself shall not exceed one-fourth of the par value of stock outstanding. The affairs of the corporation are to be conducted by a Board of Managers consisting of nine members, selected by the stockholders from among their number. The officers of the corporation shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary and a Treasurer, who shall be chosen by the Board of Managers.
