### Will Start May 28th.

Arrangements are now being completed for the McCook Automobile Trade Extension excursion to be run May 28th and 29th. A large party of McCook's business men will be in this excursion, which will cover two days, and reach considerable territory about us, in the hope of advertising our commerce and trade, and attracting people here to make their purchases, especially such trade as cannot be filled at their home towns. This will be McCook's first effort in this line, but it is hoped that results will warrant other trips and that our trade relations will improve under this method of advertising and becoming acquainted with the people surrounding us.

The plan is to take the McCook band with the party—a feature which will be keenly enjoyed and appreciated by everybody.

The itinerary takes the party from McCook to Imperial, Tuesday, May 28th, remaining at Imperial overnight. Driving over to Benkelman, Wednesday morning, and arriving at home on the evening of that day—the 29th.

If present plans are at all fully realized, the trade excursion will comprehend the liveliest bunch of boosters for a larger McCook that has "hit the road" in several moons. ### Commenced on Wells.

After thoroly testing out the soil in that neighborhood, the work of sinking the regular wells has been started. They will be located about 500 feet south of the Burlington wells. Mr. Meeker and Mr. Gray think they have found a fine water producing stratum of sand. Perhaps 9 wells in all will be sunk. Twelve inch pipe will be used, the same to be sunk between 20 and 25 feet, with the lower 10 feet perforated. These wells will all be connected up and an oil engine attached to them; this engine will draw the water from these pipes and pump same into the big wells, from which the supply for the city will be pumped by the regular pump in the power house. It is considered that these new wells will solve the question of water supply for some time to come.
