**Rev. Holly Given Reception.**

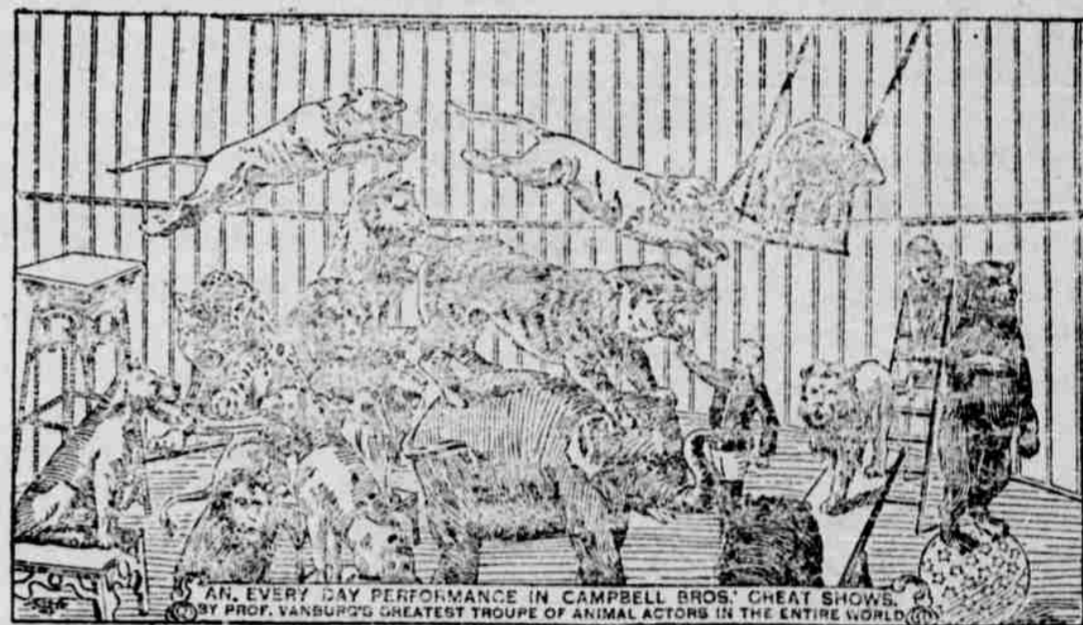
