He then went to the rear of the building and through a window saw the body of Frohberg lying on the floor behind the prescription case. He notified some of the neighbors and an entrance to the building was effected. Frohberg had evidently been dead for several hours.

Coroner Reneker was notified and going to Preston at once, he empanelled a jury which listened to the testimony in the case and returned the following verdict.
