

Our Market Letter.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Monday, Jan. 2, 1905. The supply here today is 5000 head, just about right, but Chicago reports 37,000 cattle, altogether too many. Prices are 10 lower today on killing cattle, but stockers and feeders are nearly steady. The bad market today will probably hold off receipts balance of the week and market should be as good as steady during that time. Top beef steers last week sold at \$5.50, but some orders for prime beeves were unfilled, as none of that kind came; they would have sold around \$6.00. Monday and Tuesday very few steers sold under \$4.25, but last of the week many sales were at \$4.00 or less. Good heifers sold at \$4.00 to \$4.50, fat heavy cows \$3.50 to \$4.25, medium she stuff at \$2.40 to \$3.25, and the fair to good stuff closed the week 10 to 20 cents higher. Veals sold up to \$6.50 for choicest. Stock cattle and feeders advanced a quarter, but so few of them arrived there was not much stir to the trade. A few good heavy feeders went to the country late in the week at \$3.75 to \$4.25, and range of prices for stockers, feeders and stock calves was \$2.50 to \$4.25.

According to all precedents in view of the light run, the hog market should have gained sharply last week, but it closed only 5 cents above close of previous week. Packers have not abandoned the bear side of the argument, and are still expecting to buy hogs around \$4.00 this month. Market is 5 to 10 cents lower today, with a top of \$4.55, bulk of sales \$4.25 to \$4.50. Pigs bring \$3.65 to \$3.90, light hogs \$4.10 to \$4.40, and packers weights \$4.40 to \$4.55—J. A.
