Salem, Neb., Jan. 2, '05.—Falls City Tribune—Your correspondent would ask the fruit growers of Richardson County to attend the farmers institute at Falls City, Jan. 27 and 28 and bring with you over your own signature a tabulated statement of the various kinds of fruit that perished and was lost to you last year on your farm, stating your post office address; the object of this being to present to the various transportation companies the stubborn facts that the horticultural interests of the county lost thousands of dollars and the transportation companies also lost heavily because of the fact that freight rates and express charges were such that we could not market our product and those who were hungry for them, having the money to buy at a fair price could not get them. Remember that the managers of railroads are men just like we are; they want business and all we have to do is to get up right in front of them with cold facts that will not only surprise them but will surprise many of us also, then we will get a hearing that will most certainly pave the way for a good market for our fruit this year.

Your correspondent is one of a committee of five selected by The South East Nebraska Fruit Growers Association, acting in concert with a committee of four selected by The State Horticultural Society that has been asked to compile these statistics for

Richardson County. Now let us be conservative and not exaggerate anything, rather underestimate than magnify actual facts, this is a big job without your help; altogether we can make it light on each one; good results will certainly follow, already we have the promise from the transportation companies of better things for this year.—Yours truly, R.
