### CONGRESSMAN FROM THE FIRST.

Now that Hon. E. J. Barkett has been elected United States Senator, the speculation as to his successor increases. There seems to be a general disposition on the part of the outlying counties to nominate some man outside of Lancaster County. Lincoln has had the congressman so long that the "memory of man runneth not to the contrary;" and now that the United States Senator comes from the same place, the country counties think the candidate should come from some other locality.

That Lancaster county will not tamely submit to this ultimatum may be inferred from the fact that she has five candidates, to-wit; H. M. Burgess, E. P. Holmes, Paul Clark, Judge Frost and Mr. Tobbey. In addition to this, Lancaster is suggesting candidates for the other counties with the view of having the candidates turn their delegates over to the Lancaster man in return for the federal patronage such as post offices and the like. An effort of this kind was made with George W. Marsh formerly of this county but Mr. Marsh was too wise at the game to permit himself to be used to pull Lincoln's chestnuts out of the fire. Tom Majors of Nemaha County is out for the same purpose. There is every reason to believe that Nemaha County will refuse to have its politics further prostituted by Majors. Four years ago he and Judge Stull fought the legislative ticket notwithstanding there were two United States Senators to elect. There is probably not a delegate outside of Nemaha County who would under any circumstances cast a vote for Majors, and the only possible result of his success in his home County would be to give him the right to name the post-masters of the county.

There is also some suggestion that Church Howe will be in the fight, although nothing positive is known as to this. Mr. Howe was cabled for his views and has not as yet replied. Dick Neal formerly County judge and one of the ablest and most loyal young men in the state is an admitted candidate and will in all probability be given the delegation.

Johnson County will name either A. B. Allen private secretary to Gov. Mickey or Judge David-

son. The general impression seems to be that Judge Davidson wants to be supreme Judge to succeed Judge Holcomb and might be induced to turn Johnson over to Lancaster in return for assurances of future favors. Otoe County will present Will Hayward, son of the late Senator Hayward. Mr. Hayward is a lawyer of Nebraska City and a young man of splendid parts. Ernest Pollard will have Cass County. Mr. Pollard is also a young man, a farmer and fruit grower and has long been prominent in the councils of the party. Either John B. Raper or Frank Barton will have Pawnee County.

The situation is this; a combination between Otoe, Cass, Nemaha, Richardson and either Pawnee or Johnson can furnish the candidate. To defeat Lancaster County, this sort of combination will be necessary. From what the writer knows of the sentiment of Richardson County, the delegation will probably favor some such plan. Who the man will be, no one can predict. The difficulty will be, not in finding a good man, but in effecting such a combination.
