Commercial Club.

The Commercial club met at the court house Monday night and received the report of Messrs. Greenwald and Michel who were delegates to the state conventions of commercial clubs which met at Fremont last week. The good roads question and catalogue houses also received their share of attention.

District Court.

The district court has been grinding more or less for the past two weeks with Judge Kelligar on the bench. But two jury cases were tried; the first being the case of Heim vs. First National Bank of Humboldt. This is one of several cases growing out of the Samuelson failure. The testimony showed that Mrs. Heim loaned some money to the bank through its President, F. W. Samuelson. That instead of issuing the bank's paper to the plaintiff, he pretended to do so, but issued instead his own paper signed by himself. The court instructed the jury that if it believed the bank's President Samuelson, deceived the plaintiff they should find against the bank. Samuelson testified that the transaction was a very innocent one, but the jury evidently gave no credit to his evidence as they unanimous for the plaintiff on the first ballot. A verdict for \$1779.90 was returned against the bank. There are several more cases of

the same character pending in the court.

William Perkins who was indicted for forgery was permitted to plead guilty to the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, the court giving him ninety days.

John Kruson who was indicted for running a ferry without license plead guilty and was fined \$1 and costs.

The Rulo shooting case was continued.

A. Nixon of Barada plead guilty to selling liquor without license and paid \$100 and costs. The same fine was imposed on A. Bacon of Nims City for operating a joint.

Frank Blakeney and David Delph plead guilty to running a gambling room in Nims City and were fined \$30 each.

Lillie Dixon was granted a divorce upon proof that her husband had left his happy home.

The Atwood case against the Telephona Co., was continued because of the death of the husband of the plaintiff.

The case of Shrimpton vs. The Salem Bank was continued on application of the plaintiff.

The jury was discharged on Wednesday for the term.
