Cline Wins first Honors.

The annual inter-high school debate of the southeastern Nebraska educational association came off at the Paddock opera house and attracted an audience which completely filled the place. The affirmative of the question: "Resolved that United States senators should be elected by direct vote of the people." was upheld by speakers from the schools of Pawnee City, Wilbur, Falls City and Humboldt. The negative by speakers from Crete, Beatrice, Wymore and Nebraska City.

The decision of the judges awarded first honors to the speakers on the affirmative side by unanimous vote. Positions for individual merit were awarded as

The decision of the judges met with a popular approval. It was agreed on the part of the spectators that the speaking was of the highest order ever heard in this city or on a similar occasion.
