## CALL FOR REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

The Hon. John H. Mickey, governor of the state of Nebraska, having issued a call for holding a special election in the First Congressional district in this state, for the election of a United States Representative, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of the Hon. E. J. Burkett, said election to take place on the 18th day of July, 1905; and the Republican Congressional committee of said First Congressional district having designated June 1, 1905, and Falls City, Nebraska, the date and place for holding the Republican convention for nomination of a republican candidate for United States representative; the republicans of Richardson county, Nebraska, are hereby requested to meet in convention at the court house in Falls City, Nebraska, on Saturday, the twenty-seventh day of May, 1905, at 1:30 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of selecting twenty-four delegates to the Republican Congressional convention to be held at Falls City, Nebraska, on June 1, 1905, and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the convention.

The basis of representation, being one delegate for each ten votes, or major fraction thereof, cast for the Hon. E. J. Burkett, for Representative in 1904, the several precincts being entitled to the following representation:

possible moment. Our hotels are inadequate to house all the delegates and strangers who will require rooms on the night of June 1st. There will be no serious difficulty in feeding the crowd, but the question of rooms may prove annoying unless our citizens assist in the way indicated.

If the congressional nomination is to be taken away from Lancaster county, no preference will be given to any other county and the race will develop into a free-for-all. The candidates will have practically all even chance and the candidate from Richardson should have the same chance as the candidate from Pawnee or Otoe or Cass or any county except those from Lancaster. These things will tend to make a pretty fight in the convention. But in the meantime a county convention must be held and will be very important that the Richardson county convention should remember that the man whom it will endorse stands as good a show as any of securing the nomination, which is equivalent to an election. The selection of the best possible man is therefore highly important.—Humboldt Enterprise.

The Lincoln News seems to think it assured that enough delegates can be secured from the six country counties to nominate a Lincoln man for congress. Such a result is possible.
