Market Letter

Kansas City, Mo., October 30 1905—Cattle receipts were smaller last week, but it was only because the railroads could not furnish the cars or power to bring in more. At many towns in the west cattle have been held for several days waiting for cars. The market last week was a repetition of that of the previous week. Prices held steady on everything till Friday, when what few cattle that were here sold about 10 cents lower. It was the same way last Friday, and the market ran along last week at a bout that decline from the week before; it will probably be the same way this week, about 10 lower than the general market last week. Cows are showing more strength than any other kind.

Mhe supply is 18,000 head, not as many as was expected by several thousand head. Market is steady, cows mostly 10 higher, as compared with last Friday. A few topdy beef steers are selling at \$5.40, \$5.75, prime stuff would bring around \$6.00, fair to good short fed steers \$4.75 to \$5.25. Kansas garzed Colorados, \$3.45 to \$3.90. Heavy grass cows sell at \$2.75 to \$3.00, medium grades \$2.35 to \$2.50, a few good fed cows at \$3.00 to \$3.50, nice heifers up to \$4.75. Veals are scarce, selling at \$5.50 to \$6.50 for best ones, but better calves \$4.50 to \$5.00, stock calves 25 cents lower, at \$2.75 to \$4.00. Stocker and feeder movement keeps up to about 175 cars per day, prices 10 lower for the week at \$3.00 to \$3.60 for bulk of sales. \$1.20 top last week for some heavy black feeders. Stock cows and feeders sell at \$2.00 to \$2.65, bulls \$2.25 to \$2.60. —J. S. RICK, ART, Live Stock Correspondent
