Nebraska State Teacher's Association.
 The coming meeting of the State Teacher's Association will convene in Lincoln, December 27-9 during the regular holiday vacation season. President J. W. Searson of Peru and his able assistants, the Executive Committee have prepared an exceptionally strong program. The Executive Committee consists of Supt. W. H. Gardner, Fremont; Supt. James E. Dellzell, Lexington; and Supt. A. L. Caviness, Fairbury. The railroads of Nebraska have granted a rate of one fare plus fifty cents for the round trip and the indications are that there will be one of the largest meetings in the history of the Association.

The general programs will present some excellent talent. In selecting the talent, the Committee has had in mind the special fitness of each speaker and lecturer for this kind of work. The talent is selected from among the most practical and most prominent State Association lecturers in the country. The following partial list speaks for itself: George Cramp-ton Company, artists of national reputation; Dr. George Vincent, prominent as a Chautauqua worker and National Association lecturer; Dr. C. O. Hoyt, who has lectured to State Associations in all the West Central States; John B. DeMotte already known favorably to many of our teachers; Dr. Young of arithmetic fame; Mary A. Blood

of the Columbia School of Expression who has lectured before the State Associations of New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan and Massachusetts; Dr. Myra G. Reynolds, a lecturer of rare ability; besides very strong home talent such as Dr. E. A. Ross, Supt. Davidson, Supt. McBrien and others.

Public School music will be made a prominent feature of the section programs. The Public School choruses, glee club etc., will all be under the direction of Professor D. H. Miller, Musical Director of the Lincoln City Schools. The North Platte Sextette, The Cecilia Ladies Quartet of York, and the State Normal Band and Orchestra will assist Lincoln talent in providing excellent music for the general program.

The Local Committee consisting of Supt. W. L. Stephens, chairman, Supt. O. R. Bowman, Supt. E. C. Bishop, George L. Towne, Irving S. Cutter, and J. I. Wyer will have charge of preparations for the accommodation of the large crowds expected. Those desiring to arrange for board and rooms in advance should write to J. I. Wyer as he has that department of work in charge.

Every teacher in Nebraska should plan to attend this meeting. It will more than repay the teacher who attends. Plan to be there. You owe it to your community and to yourself to avail yourself of this great opportunity for professional improvement.

Make Your Own Hectograph.
 Recipe for a hectograph (small size):—Three ounces white glue 3cents. Three and one-half ounces water. Seven ounces glycerine.

Soak the glue in the water a half-hour. Add the glycerine, and boil till the glue is melted, and cook fifteen minutes longer. Pour into a square cake tin; set away to cool, removing all bubbles with a knife. To clean after using, pour lukewarm water over the surface drying with a cloth. This will fill a pan one inch deep with a surface of fifty square inches. Thirty-three cents will pay for all the material, it will take but little labor, and you will have a home-made hectograph as good as those which are listed at several dollars each by the supply houses.

tion as given in Rule 7 of our circular of October 12 will be reversed, Friday's subjects coming on Saturday and Saturdays coming on Friday. The program for the December, 1905, examination will be as given in Rule 7. This amendment is to accommodate the teachers who cannot be excused by school boards to attend Friday's examination, and also to accommodate those whose religious observances prevent their taking the examination on Saturday.

Rule 18: Require every applicant to whom an emergency certificate may be issued to take the examination in the five essentials at the first regular examination immediately following the date of the issuance of the emergency certificate. If the results of the examination in the five essentials are satisfactory, meeting the requirements in Rule 10, the holder of such emergency certificate may continue teaching on the emergency certificate, taking the time given in Rule 2 for completing the examination. Too great care cannot be exercised in the issuance of emergency certificates.

A Trip To Alabama.
 FALLS CITY TRIBUNE: We left Falls City at 3 o'clock Wednesday morning and arrived in Elberta, Alabama at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The land of the Baldwin County Colonization Co., lies in the south eastern part of Baldwin County, Alabama and is a splendid high valley being about 150 feet above the sea level. It is not very far from the Gulf of Mexico and is one of the healthiest places in the United States. What I am writing concerning this country may sound exaggerated but it can be vouched for as the truth by Wm. Deckinger, Chas. Hilgenfeld and Gus Rothallmen who have been here. The climate is nice and warm but does not experience extreme changes as in Nebraska. Sun-strokes are unknown in Baldwin County because the breeze from the bay cools the air. The Bay Minette and Fort Morgen R. R. a branch line of the Louisville and Nashville R. R. was built last year which is a big improvement for the new country opened. This said company is going to build a large harbor at Fort Morgan and this will cause large docks, ware houses and elevators to be erected making an increase of the business around here and causing the surrounding land to be settled quickly.

Transportation on the Mobile Bay will increase in business here also. City Mobile is about 50 miles and Pensacola 25 miles distance from here making a good place for the farmers to sell their produce. The ground never freezes so that nearly everything can be raised. Early potatoes are ready for market in April thus giving plenty of time for a second crop, or a crop of rice on the same ground.

Sugar cane also yields a large crop making from 300 to 500 gallons per acre. Sweet potatoes grow like weeds and some we saw in the stores at Marlow weighed from 4 to 6 pounds apiece. Cassava, from which starch is made, also grows here in abundance and is a good food for stock. Immense crops of watermelons are grown and ripen earlier here than in any other place.

Baldwin County is the best peach country in the world and they always bring from \$1.50 to \$3.00 per bushels. We spent four days going over the country with a team and we never saw a nicer country it being so level with just enough of a slope so that the water doesn't stand on the surface when it rains.

I believe it to be a country for the man of small means as he can make his living easily and secure a home cheap.

At the same time it is a good investment for your money as the value of the land will double in a few years. I guess this is all that it is necessary to say in order to give the readers of the Tribune an idea concerning that country. I asked the secretary of the Company for advertizing matters and if any one wishes to know more about this land he can get all the information he desires by writing me and enclosing stamp for a reply. I left some samples of different kinds of plants and syrup at The Tribune office which all can see.

Next time I will write about the objects of interest we saw on our trip to Alabama.
